Dear Chair Ige, Vice-Chair Green and Members of the Health Committee:

My name is Valerie Chang. I am Executive Director of the Hawaii COPD Coalition. Our organization provides services and support to Hawaii's people affected by Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), more commonly known as emphysema, chronic bronchitis and similar conditions. COPD is the fourth leading cause of death in the US and expected to be the third leading cause of death in the US and world by 2020. Our Department of Health is one of the first who has obtained state-wide data about COPD and estimates that over 30,000 of Hawaii's people have been diagnosed with COPD, which is likely a significant underestimate as it is nationally.

I strongly SUPPORT the intent of SCR 136, for CDC Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion to develop a national plan to respond to COPD; this plan appears to be referred to in the Hawaii resolutions as a module. In its November 13, 2008 CDC report, an article about COPD was released in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR) with key findings: CDC estimates that additional health care costs total \$6000 each year for every COPD patient in the US. More than 126,000 Americans die of COPD each year. A dear colleague letter is being circulated in the US Senate to get CDC to fund a national plan to respond to COPD, with signatures due on April 27, 2009.

Currently there is NO plan in place at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to address COPD. We urge that a joint, concurrent resolution be passed to request that the CDC establish a plan with as little as one million dollars of federal funds appropriated so that CDC can begin its long overdue work to raise awareness and combat this treatable disease.

A joint, concurrent resolution by our legislature will put the State of Hawai'i on record as supporting the establishment of a chronic obstructive pulmonary disease program with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion and will give our Hawai'i Congressional Delegation a clear message of how important this issue is to our state and nation.

I propose amending the language of the current resolution to be consistent with national language used by CDC and other national organizations. The proposed amendment clarifies that the intent of the resolution is to support the creation of a comprehensive program which includes a module of surveillance questions, which the language of the resolution supports rather than only a module of questions.

For the committee's convenience and consideration, I have attached a proposed revised draft of SCR 136 (which is identical to the revision being considered for HCR 214). I would be very happy to provide any assistance and information requested, including any additional revisions. Thank you very much for the opportunity to testify on this crucial and timely subject.

 WHEREAS, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease affects as many as ten per cent of the world's population older than forty years of age and is the fourth leading cause of death in the United States; and

WHEREAS, to date, there is no cure for chronic obstructive pulmonary disease; and

WHEREAS, the federal Division of Adult and Community Health (DACH) is charged with managing programs that provide crosscutting chronic disease and health promotion expertise and support to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, and the states, communities, and other partners; and

WHEREAS, the Division of Adult and Community Health also manages several important and high-profile chronic disease prevention and control programs for specific chronic diseases, and is charged with assessing new and emerging chronic disease issues and launching new programs for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion; and

whereas, currently, there is no funded comprehensive national program on chronic obstructive pulmonary disease with information and research and a module at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; and WHEREAS, the creation of a funded Centers for Disease Control and
