Furthermore, a better understanding of divergent cultures and worldviews promotes respect between global communities and binds all collectively as one in peaceful coexistence.

Therefore, I fully support SCR127/SR83 because Hawaii as one fiftieth of the United States can motivate the rest of the Country to adopt the Declaration. The adoption would be a step toward reconciliation of a painful past to the creation of a bright future in which all people will be equal participants.
