A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. Act 51, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004, stated,
3	"Ultimately all education reform must be driven by the needs of
4	students. Students are the primary clients served by the public
5	education system and they must be served well by providing them
6	with access to the tools they need to succeed, a nurturing
7	environment conducive to learning, and supplementary
8	opportunities for growth that facilitate their development."
9	Accordingly, especially in light of the instructional hours
10	lost due to furloughs, the purpose of this Act is to require the
11	phase-in of implementation of a certain number of student
12	instructional hours at all public schools, except charter
13	schools, as follows:
14	(1) Part II requires the department of education to
15	maximize the amount of student instructional hours
16	provided to students under relevant collective
17	bargaining agreements in effect during the 2010-2011
18	school year;

1	(2)	Part III requires the establishment of a certain
2		number of student instructional hours per school year
3		for elementary and secondary school grades, for the
4		2011-2013 school years, and for the 2013-2015 school
5		years;
6	(3)	Part IV requires the department of education to, with
7		the board of education and Office of the Governor, and
8		in consultation with representatives of the affected
9		collective bargaining units, submit to the
10		legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the
11		convening of the 2012 regular session, a plan to
12		provide students with a higher number of student
13		instructional hours per school year for elementary and
14		secondary school grades, for future school years; and
15	(4)	Part V requires the department of education to
16		consider pick-up and drop-off times that optimize its
17		transportation services while minimizing costs to the
18		State, if implementation of such student instructional
19		hours results in varying schedules for the
20		transportation of students.

1	PART II
2	SECTION 2. The department of education shall maximize the
3	amount of student instructional hours provided at all public
4	schools, except charter schools, under relevant collective
5	bargaining agreements in effect during the 2010-2011 school
6	year. For purposes of this section, "student instructional
7	hours" shall have the same meaning as in section 302A- ,
8	Hawaii Revised Statutes.
9	PART III
10	SECTION 3. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
12	and to read as follows:
13	"S302A- School year; instructional time. (a)
14	Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, for the 2011-2013
15	school years, all public schools, except charter schools, shall
16	implement a school year of one hundred eighty days, excluding
17	professional development days and other non-instructional days
18	negotiated pursuant to chapter 89, that shall include:
19	(1) Nine hundred fifteen student instructional hours for
20	the elementary school grades; and
21	(2) Nine hundred ninety student instructional hours for
22	the secondary school grades.

• 1	(b) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, for the
2	2013-2015 school years, all public schools, except charter
3	schools, shall implement a school year of one hundred eighty
4	days, excluding professional development days and other non-
5	instructional days negotiated pursuant to chapter 89, that shall
6	include one thousand eighty student instructional hours for both
7	elementary and secondary school grades.
8	(c) For purposes of this section, "student instructional
9	hours means student learning time during which students are
10	engaged in learning activities including regularly-scheduled
11	instruction and learning assessments within the curriculum, and
12	does not include lunch, recess, or passing time."
13	PART IV
14	SECTION 4. The department of education shall, with the
15	board of education and office of the governor, and in
16	consultation with representatives of the affected collective
17	bargaining units, submit to the legislature, no later than
18	twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of
19	2012, a plan to implement a school year of one hundred ninety
20	days, excluding professional development days and other non-
21	instructional days negotiated pursuant to chapter 89, Hawaii
22	Revised Statutes, that shall include one thousand one hundred

- 1 forty student instructional hours for both elementary and
- 2 secondary school grades at all public schools, except charter
- 3 schools, for school years beginning with the 2015-2016 school
- 4 year. For purposes of this section, "student instructional
- 5 hours" shall have the same meaning as in section 302A-
- 6 Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 7 PART V
- 8 SECTION 5. Section 302A-406, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- 10 "(a) The department may provide suitable transportation to
- 11 and from school and for educational field trips for all children
- 12 in grades kindergarten to twelve and in special education
- 13 classes. The department shall adopt such policy, procedure, and
- 14 program as it deems necessary to provide suitable
- 15 transportation. In formulating the policy, procedure, and
- 16 program, the department shall consider the school district; the
- 17 school attendance area in which a school child normally resides;
- 18 the distance the school child lives from the school; the
- 19 availability of public carriers or other means of
- 20 transportation; the frequency, regularity, and availability of
- 21 public transportation; and the grade level, physical handicap,
- 22 or special learning disability of a school child, and it may



- 1 also consider such conditions and circumstances unique or
- 2 peculiar to a county or area. If the implementation of student
- 3 instructional hours pursuant to section 302A- results in
- 4 varying schedules for the transportation of students, the
- 5 department shall consider pick-up and drop-off times that
- 6 optimize the department's transportation services while
- 7 minimizing costs to the State."
- 8 PART VI
- 9 SECTION 6. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 10 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 11 begun before its effective date.
- 12 SECTION 7. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
