## <u>H</u>.B. NO. 1110

# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER PROTECTION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Current state law requires that an individual 2 registering as a voter in any county in the State of Hawaii make an application in the form of an affidavit that includes the 3 name, the social security number, the date of birth, and the 4 residence, including the mailing address. Additionally, the 5 department of health is mandated to provide to the county clerks 6 a list of the names of all citizens of voting age or over whose 7 deaths have been recorded in the department during each month. 8 9 The list shall be sufficient to allow county clerks to identify registered voters who have died and, currently, the county 10 clerks request the full social security number of the deceased. 11

12 The use of social security numbers as identity markers 13 substantially increases the risk of identity theft. State 14 government has made strides to decrease its use of social 15 security numbers and to increase criminal penalties for misuse 16 of social security numbers. Modernized data matching procedures 17 are now able to match records using the last name, the first 18 name, the date of birth, and the last four digits of the social

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security number with a high degree of accuracy. These modern
data matching procedures are effective and render the use of
full social security numbers unnecessary and inefficient.

The purpose of this bill is to reduce the use of full social security numbers for identification purposes by allowing the department of health to redact all but the last four digits of social security numbers provided to county clerks for the purposes of eliminating deceased persons from the voter rolls.

9 SECTION 2. Section 338-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is10 amended to read as follows:

\$338-4 Deaths reported to county clerks. The department 11 of health shall within six weeks after the end of each month 12 13 deliver, or forward by mail, to the county clerk of each county a list of the names of all citizens of voting age or over whose 14 deaths have been recorded in the department during each month. 15 The list shall [set forth such portion of the information 16 contained in the death record of] include the first name, last 17 name, date of birth, date of death, and last four digits of the 18 social security number of each citizen whose death is so 19 reported [as will be of assistance to the county clerk in 20 21 identification]. If the reported information of a deceased 22 citizen matches the information of more than one citizen on the

2	health of that problem, the department of health shall provide
3	the full social security number of that deceased citizen."
4	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
5	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

TITLE: A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER PROTECTION.

PURPOSE: The purpose of this bill is to redefine the data that the Department of Health (DOH) must report to county clerks. Full social security numbers would no longer be provided, instead only the last four digits of the social security number would be provided for purposes of identification.

MEANS: Amend section 338-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION: Current state law requires that an individual registering as a voter in any county in the State of Hawaii make an application in the form of an affidavit that includes their name, social security number, date of birth, and residence, including mailing address. Additionally, the DOH is mandated to provide to the county clerks a list of the names of all citizens of voting age or over whose deaths have been recorded in the department during each month.
