H.B. NO. 1487

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the over representation of native Hawaiians in the criminal justice
 system is an issue that has not been adequately addressed.

The legislature further finds that any racial or ethnic disparity within the State's criminal justice system fosters public mistrust of the system and impedes the State's ability to promote public safety. A commitment to a fair criminal justice system and functioning democratic society requires addressing these existing racial and ethnic disparities.

10 According to recent studies, native Hawaiians account for 11 twenty per cent of the total population but forty per cent of 12 the prison population. Native Hawaiians average twenty-three 13 per cent of all arrests in the State, and are twice as likely to 14 be incarcerated as any other group. In 1999, it was reported 15 that more than fifty per cent of the female population and more 16 than sixty per cent of the male population, at the Hawaii Youth 17 Correctional Facility were native Hawaiian.



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1 The high rates of incarceration have profound implications 2 for native Hawaiians. For example, almost sixty per cent of 3 children placed in child protective services are native 4 Hawaiian. Of those children, eight per cent to thirty-three per 5 cent have incarcerated parents. Studies suggest that adult 6 children of incarcerated mothers are two and one-half times more 7 likely to be incarcerated than adult children of incarcerated fathers. Ninety-five per cent of the one hundred twenty female 8 9 Hawaii inmates incarcerated at a single mainland facility are 10 mothers.

11 Incarceration has many long-term effects including negative 12 impacts on health, family instability, diminished lifetime 13 wages, social stigma, and educational limitations. These 14 negative impacts result in higher rates of illness and death. 15 The purpose of this Act is to conduct a study on the 16 extent, nature, and impact of disparate treatment of native 17 Hawaiians and other ethnic groups in the State's criminal 18 justice system.

SECTION 2. (a) The office of Hawaiian affairs shall
conduct a study on the disparate treatment of native Hawaiians
and other ethnic groups in the State's criminal justice system.



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1	(b)	The following members shall jointly contribute to the
2	study:	
3	(1)	The administrator of the office of Hawaiian affairs or
4		the administrator's designee;
5	(2)	The dean of the William S. Richardson School of Law,
6		University of Hawaii at Manoa or the dean's designee;
7	(3)	The president of Alu Like, Inc. or the president's
8		designee;
9	(4)	The president of the American Civil Liberties Union of
10		Hawaii or the president's designee;
11	(5)	The executive director of the Justice Policy Institute
12		or the executive director's designee; and
13	(6)	The president of the Queen Liliuokalani Children's
14		Center or the president's designee.
15	(c)	The study shall include but not be limited to:
16	(1)	Identifying the stages in the criminal justice system
17		with a disproportionate representation of native
18		Hawaiians and other ethnic groups. The stages shall
19		include the:
20		(A) Entry point, whether emergency call or arrest;



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1		(B) Court processes, including court appearances,	
2		prosecutorial review, plea bargains, and	
3		sentencing; and	
4		(C) Exit from incarceration, including parole,	
5		probation, and recidivism rates;	
6	(2)	Assessing the decision points in the stages identified	
7		to determine where disparities occur;	
8	(3)	Identifying the cause for the disparities and the	
9		extent to which they are related to legitimate public	
10		safety objectives, including sentencing policies, drug	
11		laws and policies, and the availability of appropriate	
12		intervention and treatment options; and	
13	(4)	Identifying methods of recidivism prevention and	
14		facilitating offenders' successful reentry into the	
15		community.	
16	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
17	revenues c	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$15,000 or so much	
18	thereof as	may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 and the	
19	same sum c	or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year	
20	2010-2011	for the purposes of this Act, provided that no funds	
21	shall be m	nade available under this Act unless the office of	



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Hawaiian affairs provides a matching amount for the purpose for
 which these sums are appropriated.

3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of4 Hawaiian affairs for the purposes of this Act.

5 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2009.
