A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the over-
- 2 representation of native Hawaiians in the criminal justice
- 3 system is an issue that has not been adequately addressed.
- 4 The legislature further finds that any racial or ethnic
- 5 disparity within the State's criminal justice system fosters
- 6 public mistrust of the system and impedes the State's ability to
- 7 promote public safety. A commitment to a fair criminal justice
- 8 system and functioning democratic society requires addressing
- 9 these existing racial and ethnic disparities.
- 10 According to recent studies, native Hawaiians account for
- 11 twenty per cent of the total population but forty per cent of
- 12 the prison population. Native Hawaiians average twenty-three
- 13 per cent of all arrests in the state, and are twice as likely to
- 14 be incarcerated as any other ethnic group. In 1999, it was
- 15 reported that more than fifty per cent of the female population
- 16 and more than sixty per cent of the male population, at the
- 17 Hawaii youth correctional facility were native Hawaiian.

- 1 The high rates of incarceration have profound implications
- 2 for native Hawaiians. For example, almost sixty per cent of
- 3 children placed in child protective services are native
- 4 Hawaiian. Of those children, eight per cent to thirty-three per
- 5 cent have incarcerated parents. Studies suggest that adult
- 6 children of incarcerated mothers are two and one-half times more
- 7 likely to be incarcerated than adult children of incarcerated
- 8 fathers. Ninety-five per cent of the one hundred twenty female
- 9 Hawaii inmates incarcerated at a single mainland facility are
- 10 mothers.
- 11 Incarceration has many long-term effects, including
- 12 negative impacts on health, family instability, diminished
- 13 lifetime wages, social stigma, and educational limitations.
- 14 These negative impacts result in higher rates of illness and
- 15 death.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to conduct a study on the
- 17 extent, nature, and impact of disparate treatment of native
- 18 Hawaiians and other ethnic groups in the State's criminal
- 19 justice system.
- 20 SECTION 2. (a) The office of Hawaiian affairs shall
- 21 contract with a nationally respected and objective consulting
- 22 firm to conduct a study on the disparate treatment of native

- 3 (b) The study shall include, but not be limited to:
- 4 (1) The extent of disparate representation of native
- 5 Hawaiians and other ethnic groups in Hawaii's criminal
- 6 justice system, focusing on conviction rates and
- 7 sentencing outcomes, to include data from the entry
- 8 point (911 calls, assessment, and arrest) to the
- 9 actual process (court appearances, prosecutorial
- 10 review, plea bargain, sentencing) and exit (parole,
- 11 probation, and recidivism rates) of the criminal
- justice system;
- 13 (2) The causes of any disparities, including but not
- limited to Hawaii's sentencing policies and drug laws;
- **15** and
- 16 (3) The barriers that disparate treatment poses to
- 17 preventing recidivism and facilitating the offenders'
- 18 successful re-entry into the community.
- (c) All government agencies involved in the State's
- 20 criminal justice system shall provide their full cooperation and
- 21 all relevant data and other information to the office of

- 1 Hawaiian affairs and its consultant during the planning and
- 2 implementation of the study.
- 3 SECTION 3. The office of Hawaiian affairs shall submit,
- 4 not later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular
- 5 Session of 2010, the consultant's findings and recommendations,
- 6 including any proposed legislation, for reducing disparate
- 7 treatment of native Hawaiians and other ethnic groups in
- 8 Hawaii's criminal justice system.
- 9 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$15,000 or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 and the
- 12 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 13 2010-2011 for the purposes of this Act, provided that no funds
- 14 shall be made available under this Act unless the office of
- 15 Hawaiian affairs provides a matching amount for the purpose for
- 16 which these sums are appropriated.
- 17 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of
- 18 Hawaiian affairs for the purposes of this Act.
- 19 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2009.
