H.B. NO. 1605

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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TAXATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. As Hawaii nears the fiftieth anniversary of its 2 statehood, there is no better time to review and evaluate one of 3 state and local government's most import functions -- taxation. Taxation not only provides revenue for government programs and 4 5 operations, it is a reflection of the goals, priorities, and 6 values of our community. Taxes serve as a means to direct social and economic policy, providing incentives and deterrents 7 to impact human and corporate behavior to achieve economic and 8 9 social goals. Taxes can also provide a fair and equitable way 10 to balance the needs and resources of Hawaii's diverse taxpaying residents and entities. 11

12 Applied to dozens of revenue sources ranging from 13 individual and corporate income, real property, transit 14 accommodations, fuel, general excise, liquor, tobacco, 15 unemployment, conveyance and other sources, Hawaii's tax system has evolved over the decades. Whenever tax authorizations are 16 17 established, lawmakers make those decisions considering social, economic and community goals and conditions that are relevant at 18 HB LRB 09-1479.doc

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1 the time. As time passes, however, economic and social 2 conditions change, calling into question the relevancy, 3 effectiveness, or applicability of the goals and purposes of the 4 tax when created. Some existing tax laws were enacted before 5 statehood and continue to be imposed on residents and entities 6 without review and update.

7 The purpose of this Act is to obtain the information and 8 perspectives necessary to enact legislation that will improve 9 and adjust Hawaii's tax code to meet current and future 10 community goals.

11 SECTION 2. (a) There is established and attached to the 12 department of budget and finance for administrative purposes 13 only, the Hawaii tax review initiative, the purpose of which 14 shall be to explore the historical development and evolution of 15 taxation in Hawaii to determine if the State's tax policies are 16 relevant and effective in achieving Hawaii's current long-term 17 economic and social goals and objectives.

(b) Five local and national tax and economics specialists
shall be appointed to the Hawaii tax review initiative and shall
review the State's tax code and comment on how the State's tax
policy impacts:

13	two shall	be local tax and economic specialists.
14	(c)	Members of the Hawaii tax review initiative shall
15	serve wit	hout compensation but shall be reimbursed for necessary
16	expenses,	including travel expenses.
17	(d)	The Hawaii tax review initiative shall submit a
18	written report of its findings and recommendations, including	
19	any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than	
20	twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of	
21	2010 and participate in a statewide tax symposium to be	

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1 presented to the legislature and general public during the * 2 regular session of 2010. 3 (e) The Hawaii tax review imitative shall cease to exist on June 30, 2010. 4 5 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 7 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 for the

8 operations of the Hawaii tax review initiative.

9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 10 budget and finance for the purposes of this Act.

11 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2009.

Description:

Establishes the Hawaii tax review initiative to review and report on whether Hawaii's tax policies are relevant and effective in achieving Hawaii's long-term economic and social goals and objectives.

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
