A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PURCHASES OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that procurement laws regarding request for proposal procedures for the purchase of 2 health and human services need to be clarified. Currently, the 3 4 request for proposal procedure allows for-profit organizations 5 intending to bid for health and human services contracts to 6 submit a "pre-tax" bid. The ability to submit a "pre-tax bid" 7 does not apply to not-for-profit companies because not-for-8 profits are not subject to the insurance premium tax which is 9 mandated by Hawaii law.

10 In 2008, two for-profit companies bid for the QUEST 11 Expanded Access Program contracts and were awarded the 12 contracts. In addition, the administration and the department 13 of human services agreed to rebate the amount of the insurance 14 premium tax of 4.265 per cent to these companies, resulting in a 15 higher award amount than the companies had bid. It appears that 16 the state administration, during these difficult financial 17 times, will be "rebating" these companies approximately

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\$25,000,000 and then the companies will pay their taxes with
 these funds. Concerned groups have argued that this is not
 proper, if not illegal, because the legislature is the only
 branch of government with the power to impose, waive, or rebate
 a tax by exempting certain types of organizations.

6 On December 18, 2008, in *Hawaii Insurers Council vs.* 7 Lingle, 120 Hawaii 51, 201 P.3d 564 (2008), the Hawaii supreme 8 court held that only the legislature has the power to tax 9 persons or entities. The court further held that "[t]he 10 executive branch is left only with the power to administer and 11 enforce the state's tax laws, not to levy new taxes."

The purpose of this Act is to clarify that any organization 12 13 that is awarded a contract through state procurement laws and 14 the request for proposal process shall not be entitled to 15 receive more money, in any form, than the amount of the bid. Ιt 16 further requires bidders to be properly licensed in the State to 17 conduct the business being sought by the request for proposals, 18 unless the business being sought is not required by the State to 19 be licensed.

20 SECTION 2. Chapter 103F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
22 and to read as follows:
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1	" <u>§103</u>	Proposals. Proposals subject to this chapter
2	shall be:	
3	(1)	Submitted by an applicant duly licensed in the state
4		to conduct the business being sought by the request
5		for proposals; provided that the applicant is required
6		by statute to be licensed to conduct the business
7		being sought by the request for proposals; and
8	(2)	For an amount not to exceed the contract amount to be
9		expended by the State, regardless of the tax status of
10		the applicant."
11	SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that	
12	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were	
13	begun, before its effective date.	
14	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.	
15	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Description:

Specifies that proposals for purchases of health and human services must be submitted by duly licensed providers, unless statutes do not require the business to be licensed to provide the service being bid on. Requires the proposal to be an amount not exceeding the contract amount to be expended by the State. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD2)
