## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii
2	Constitution provides for the preservation and promotion of
3	native Hawaiian culture, history, and language. For example,
4	article X, section 4, provides that, "[t]he State shall promote
5	the study of Hawaiian culture, history and language." Article
6	XII, section 7, states that "[t]he State reaffirms and shall
7	protect all rights, customarily and traditionally exercised for
8	subsistence, cultural and religious purposes" of native
9	Hawaiians. Because maintaining a living language is an integral
10	component of preserving a culture, it is also important to note
11	that article XV, section 4, establishes that "English and
12	Hawaiian shall be the official languages of Hawaii"
13	Since 1978, when the State reaffirmed Hawaiian as one of
14	its official languages, the legislature has backed efforts to
15	incorporate the language into official state writings, emblems,
16	and signs. Ensuring that these public inscriptions are

mandatory, accurate, and spelled correctly, and use of the

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- 1 proper Hawaiian macrons and glottal stops, not only shows the
- 2 deserved respect for the native language of these islands, but
- 3 also fully comports with the intent and words of the Hawaii
- 4 Constitution.
- 5 The purpose of this Act is to ensure the constitutionally-
- 6 and ethically-mandated preservation of the native Hawaiian
- 7 language and culture by requiring that all state and county
- 8 letterheads, emblems, and symbols, when newly created, replaced,
- 9 reprinted, or otherwise revised, contain the accurate,
- 10 appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and language.
- 11 SECTION 2. Section 1-13.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended to read as follows:
- "[f] \$1-13.5[f] Hawaiian language; spelling. [Macrons and
- 14 glottal stops may be used in the spelling of words or terms in
- 15 the Hawaiian language in documents [ (a) Effective January 1,
- 16 2011, all letterheads prepared by or for [state] State or county
- 17 agencies or officials [-] shall include the accurate,
- 18 appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and language,
- 19 including proper Hawaiian spelling and punctuation, including
- 20 macrons and glottal stops, printed above the English
- 21 translation; provided that any revision to conform any
- 22 letterhead existing on or before January 1, 2011, to the

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- requirements of this section, may be implemented when the

  letterhead requires replacement or reprinting, or otherwise

  requires revision. Any rule, order, policy, or other act,
- 4 official or otherwise, that prohibits or discourages the use of
- 5 [these symbols] proper Hawaiian punctuation or spelling shall be
- 6 void.
- 7 (b) The Hawaiian language shall be accurate, appropriate,
- 8 and authentic when printed in conformance with:
- 9 (1) The "Hawaiian Dictionary: Hawaiian-English, English-
- 10 Hawaiian," by Mary Kawena Pukui and Samuel H. Elbert,
- 11 University of Hawaii Press, copyright 1986; or
- 12 (2) "Māmaka Kaiao: A Modern Hawaiian Vocabulary,"
- developed by Kōmike Hua'olelo, the Hawaiian Lexicon
- 14 Committee."
- 15 SECTION 3. Section 5-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended to read as follows:
- "[+] \$5-6.5[+] State language. (a) The Hawaiian language
- 18 is the native language of Hawaii and [may], effective January 1,
- 19 2011, shall be used on all emblems and symbols representative of
- 20 the State, its departments, agencies, and political
- 21 subdivisions [-]; provided that for emblems and symbols existing
- 22 on January 1, 2011, conformance with this section may be delayed

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- 1 until a replacement for the emblem or symbol otherwise is
- 2 required.
- 3 (b) The Hawaiian language as used on all emblems and
- 4 symbols shall be in conformance with the requirements of section
- 5 1-13.5(b)."
- 6 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Hawaiian Language; Letterheads; Emblems; Symbols

## Description:

Requires that all state and county letterheads, emblems, and symbols, when newly created, replaced, reprinted, or otherwise revised, contain the accurate, appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and language. (HB1666 HD1)
