A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Section 302B-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:

"(d) An application to become a start-up charter school
shall include a detailed implementation plan that meets the
requirements of this subsection and section 302B-9. The plan
shall include the following:

Section 302B-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 amended to read as follows: 7 "§302B-8 Charter school administrative office. (a) There 8 is established a charter school administrative office, which 9 shall be attached to the department for administrative purposes 10 only. The office shall be administered by an executive 11 director, who shall be appointed without regard to chapters 76 12 and 89 by the panel based upon the recommendations of an 13 organization of charter schools operating within the [State] 14 state or from a list of nominees submitted by the charter 15 schools. The panel shall hire the executive director, who may 16 be contracted for a term of up to four years; shall offer the 17 executive director a written contract; and may terminate the 18 executive director's contract only for cause. The executive 19 director, with the approval of the panel, may hire necessary 20 staff without regard to chapters 76 and 89 to assist in the 21 administration of the office.

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1	(b)	The executive director, under the direction of the
2	panel and	in consultation with the charter schools, shall be
3	responsib	le for the internal organization, operation, and
4	managemen	t of the charter school system, including:
5	(1)	Preparing and executing the budget for the charter
6		schools, including submission of the budget request to
7		the board, the governor, and the legislature;
8	(2)	Allocating annual appropriations to the charter
9		schools and distribution of federal funds to charter
10		schools;
11	(3)	Complying with applicable state laws related to the
12		administration of the charter schools;
13	(4)	Preparing contracts between the charter schools and
14		the department for centralized services to be provided
15		by the department;
16	(5)	Preparing contracts between the charter schools and
17		other state agencies for financial or personnel
18		services to be provided by the agencies to the charter
19		schools;
20	(6)	Providing independent analysis and recommendations on
21		charter school issues;

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1	(7)	Representing charter schools and the charter school
2		system in communications with the board, the governor,
3		and the legislature;
4	(8)	Providing advocacy, assistance, and support for the
5		development, growth, progress, and success of charter
6		schools and the charter school system;
7	(9)	Providing guidance and assistance to charter
8		applicants and charter schools to enhance the
9	•	completeness and accuracy of information for panel
10		review;
11	(10)	Assisting charter applicants and charter schools in
12		coordinating their interactions with the panel as
13		needed;
14	(11)	Assisting the panel to coordinate with charter schools
15		in panel investigations and evaluations of charter
16		schools;
17	(12)	Serving as the conduit to disseminate communications
18		from the panel, the board, and the department to all
19		charter schools;
20	(13)	Determining charter school system needs and
21		communicating those needs to the panel, the board, and
22		the department;
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
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1	(14)	Establishing a dispute resolution and mediation
2		process; and
3	(15)	Upon request by one or more charter schools, assisting
4		in the negotiation of a collective bargaining
5		agreement with the exclusive representative of its
6		employees.
7	(c)	The executive director shall be evaluated annually by
8	the panel	. The annual evaluation shall be conducted
9	sufficien	tly in advance of the end of a term to provide the
10	executive	director the opportunity to respond to concerns and
11	improve p	erformance.
12	(d)	The salary of the executive director and staff shall
13	be set by	the panel based upon the recommendations of charter
14	schools w	ithin the [State;] <u>state;</u> provided that the salaries
15	and opera	tional expenses of the office shall be paid from the
16	annual ch	arter school appropriation and shall not exceed two per
17	cent of t	he total allocation in any fiscal year.
18	[-(e)-	- The office shall include in its annual budget request
19	additiona	l funds to cover the estimated costs of:
20	(1)	Vacation and sick leave accrued by employees
21		transferring to a charter school from another state
22		agency or department;

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1	(2) Substitute teachers needed when a teacher is out on
2	vacation or sick leave;
3	(3) Adjustments to enrollments; and
4	(4) Arbitration in the grievance process.
5	(f) (e) The office shall withhold funds for charter
6	school enrollments that are inconsistent with approved detailed
7	implementation plans.
8	[(g)] <u>(f)</u> The office shall withhold funds to repay
9	overpayments or over-allocations received by charter schools
10	when not repaid in a timely manner in accordance with rules
11	adopted by the board.
12	[(h)] <u>(g)</u> The office may carry over funds from previous
13	year allocations. Funds distributed to charter schools shall be
14	considered expended."
15	SECTION 4. Section 302B-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended to read as follows:
17	"§302B-12 Funding and finance. [(a) Beginning with
18	fiscal year 2006-2007, and each fiscal year thereafter, the
19	office shall submit a request for general fund appropriations
20	for each charter school based upon:
21	(1) The actual and projected enrollment figures in the
22	current school-year for-each-charter school;



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1	(2)	A per-pupil amount for each regular education and
2		special education student, which shall be equivalent
3		to the total per-pupil cost based upon average
4		enrollment in all regular education cost categories,
5		including comprehensive school support services but
6		excluding special education services, and for all
7		means of financing except federal funds, as reported
8		in the most recently approved executive budget
9		recommendations for the department; provided that in
10		preparing the budget the executive director shall
11		include an analysis of the proposed budget in
12		relationship to the most recently published department
13		consolidated annual financial report; provided further
14		that the legislature may make an adjustment to the
15		per pupil allocation for the purposes of this section;
16		and
17	(3)	Those fringe benefit costs requested shall be included
18	~	in the department of budget and finance's annual
19		budget request. No fringe benefit costs shall be
20		charged directly to or deducted from the charter
21		school per-pupil-allocations unless they are already

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1	included in the funds distributed to the charter
2	school.
3	The legislature shall make an appropriation based upon the
4	budget request; provided that the legislature may make
5	additional appropriations for fringe, workers' compensation, and
6	other employee benefits, facility costs, and other requested
7	amounts.
8	The governor, pursuant to chapter 37, may impose
9	restrictions or reductions on charter school appropriations
10	similar to those imposed on other public schools.]
11	(a) The office, in submitting its budgetary request to the
12	director of finance, shall also submit a report of all means of
13	financing.
14	(b) Charter schools shall be eligible for all federal
15	financial support to the same extent as all other public
16	schools. The department shall provide the office with all
17	state-level federal grant proposals submitted by the department
18	that include charter schools as potential recipients and timely
19	reports on state-level federal grants received for which charter
20	schools may apply or are entitled to receive. Federal funds
21	received by the department for charter schools shall be
22	transferred to the office for distribution to charter schools in
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1 accordance with the federal requirements. If administrative 2 services related to federal grants and subsidies are provided to 3 the charter school by the department, the charter school shall 4 reimburse the department for the actual costs of the 5 administrative services in an amount that shall not exceed six 6 and one-half per cent of the charter school's federal grants and 7 subsidies.


8 Any charter school shall be eligible to receive any 9 supplemental federal grant or award for which any other public 10 school may submit a proposal, or any supplemental federal grants 11 limited to charter schools; provided that if department 12 administrative services, including funds management, budgetary, 13 fiscal accounting, or other related services, are provided with 14 respect to these supplemental grants, the charter school shall 15 reimburse the department for the actual costs of the 16 administrative services in an amount that shall not exceed six 17 and one-half per cent of the supplemental grant for which the 18 services are used.

19 All additional funds generated by the local school boards,
20 that are not from a supplemental grant, shall be held separate
21 from allotted funds and may be expended at the discretion of the
22 local school boards.

19		(B)	An accounting of the percentage of student
20			enrollment that transferred from public schools
21			established and maintained by the department;
22			provided that these accountings shall also be

4	(3) Retain the remaining ten per cent of a charter
5	school's per-pupil-allocation no later than January 1
6	of each year as a contingency balance to ensure fiscal
7	accountability;
8	provided that the panel may make adjustments in allocations
9	based on noncompliance with federal and state reporting
10	requirements, the office's administrative procedures, and board
11	approved accountability requirements.
12	(d) (c) The department shall provide appropriate
13	transitional resources to a conversion charter school for its
14	first year of operation as a charter school based upon the
15	department's allocation to the school for the year prior to the
16	conversion.
17	[(e)] <u>(d)</u> No start-up charter school or conversion charter
18	school may assess tuition."
19	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
21	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.

Description:

Eliminates the per-pupil method of funding for charter schools, requiring the charter schools to follow the same budgetary request process as other state agencies. Requires the Charter School Administrative Office to submit a report of all means of financing with its budgetary request to the Director of Finance. (HB1686 HD2)
