A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII TOURISM AUTHORITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
2	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
3	as follows:

6	§ -1 Definitions. The following definitions, whenever

10	"Department" means the department of tourism.

12	§ -2 General powers and duties of the department. (a)
13	The department shall have general charge, oversight, and care of
14	tourism and related activities in the state. It shall be the
15	objective of the department to promote activities that support,
16	maintain, and expand the state's domestic and international

2	expenditu	res, tax revenue, and employment.
3	S	-3 Tourism-related activities. (a) The department
4	may enter	into contracts and agreements that include:

9	(4)	Promotion, development, and coordination of sports-
10		related activities and events;
11	(5)	Promotion of Hawaii, through a coordinated statewide

16		of the convention center facility, including the
17		purchase or sale of goods or services, logo items,

21		enterprise or as a world-class facility for
22		conventions, entertainment, or public events; and

- 2 (c) Moneys in the convention center enterprise special
- 3 fund may be:
- 4 (1) Placed in interest-bearing accounts; provided that the
- 5 depository in which the money is deposited furnishes
- 6 security as provided in section 38-3; or
- 7 (2) Otherwise invested by the department until such time
- 8 as the moneys may be needed; provided that the
- 9 department shall limit its investments to those listed
- 10 in section 36-21.
- 11 All interest accruing from investment of the moneys shall be
- 12 credited to the convention center enterprise special fund.
- 13 § -5 Tourism emergency trust fund. (a) There is
- 14 established outside the state treasury a tourism emergency trust
- 15 fund to be administered by the department as trustee, into which
- 16 shall be deposited the revenues prescribed by section
- 17 237D-6.5(b). All investment earnings from moneys in the trust
- 18 fund shall be credited to the tourism special fund.
- 19 (b) Moneys in the trust fund shall be used exclusively to
- 20 provide for the development and implementation of emergency
- 21 measures to respond to any tourism emergency, upon declaration
- 22 by the governor that a tourism emergency exists that adversely

- 1 affects Hawaii's tourism industry by resulting in a substantial
- 2 interruption in the commerce of the State and adversely

- 4 emergency assistance to tourists during the tourism emergency.

20	the tourism special fund shall be transferred into the
21	respective fund of the same name established pursuant to section
22	1 of this Act.

1 No officer or employee of the State having tenure shall 2 suffer any loss of salary, seniority, prior service credit, 3 vacation, sick leave, or other employee benefit or privilege as a consequence of this Act, and such officer or employee may be 4 5 transferred or appointed to a civil service position without the 6 necessity of examination; provided that the officer or employee 7 possesses the minimum qualifications for the position to which 8 transferred or appointed; and provided that subsequent changes 9 in status may be made pursuant to applicable civil service and 10 compensation laws. 11 An officer or employee of the State who does not have 12 tenure and who may be transferred or appointed to a civil 13 service position as a consequence of this Act shall become a 14 civil service employee without the loss of salary, seniority, 15 prior service credit, vacation, sick leave, or other employee 16 benefits or privileges and without the necessity of examination; **17** provided that such officer or employee possesses the minimum 18 qualifications for the position to which transferred or 19 appointed. 20 If an office or position held by an officer or employee 21 having tenure is abolished, the officer or employee shall not thereby be separated from public employment, but shall remain in 22

- 10 that relate to tourism and which are reenacted or made
- 11 applicable to the department of tourism by this Act, shall
- 12 remain in full force and effect until amended or repealed by the
- 13 department of tourism pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised
- 14 Statutes. In the interim, every reference to the Hawaii tourism
- 15 authority and department of business, economic development and
- 16 tourism, in those rules, policies, procedures, guidelines, and
- 17 other material is amended to refer to the department of tourism
- 18 or director of tourism, as appropriate.
- 19 SECTION 14. It is the intent of this Act not to jeopardize
- 20 the receipt of any federal aid nor to impair the obligation of
- 21 the State or any agency thereof to the holders of any bond
- 22 issued by the State or by any such agency, and to the extent,

- 1 and only to the extent, necessary to effectuate this intent, the
- 2 governor may modify the strict provisions of this Act, but shall
- 3 promptly report any such modification with reasons therefor to
- 4 the legislature at its next session thereafter for review by the
- 5 legislature.
- 6 SECTION 15. This Act does not affect rights and duties
- 7 that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that
- 8 were begun, before its effective date.
- 9 SECTION 16. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 10 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 11 SECTION 17. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2112.
