A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to repeal the board
- 2 of regent's authority to expend up to \$3,000,000 from the
- 3 tuition and fees special fund to promote alumni relations and
- 4 generate private donations to the University of Hawaii
- 5 Foundation.
- 6 SECTION 2. Section 304A-2153, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 7 amended to read as follows:
- 8 "[+] §304A-2153[+] University of Hawaii tuition and fees
- 9 special fund. (a) There is established the University of
- 10 Hawaii tuition and fees special fund into which shall be
- 11 deposited all revenue collected by the university for regular,
- 12 summer, and continuing education credit tuition, tuition-related
- 13 course and fee charges, and any other charges to students,
- 14 except as provided by law. Moneys deposited into the fund shall
- 15 be expended to maintain or improve the university's programs and
- 16 operations and shall not be:

1	(1)	Used as a justification for reducing any budget	
2		request or allotment to the university unless the	
3		university requests such a reduction;	
4	(2)	Transferred unless otherwise authorized by the	
5		legislature; and	
6	(3)	Restricted by the governor or the director of finance	
7		without the prior approval of the legislature.	
8	Any	rule, policy, or action of any agency or individual in	
9	contravention of this subsection shall be void as against publi		
10	policy.		
11	[(b) Any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the board c		
12	regents may authorize expenditures of up to \$3,000,000 annually		
13	excluding	-in kind services, from this fund for the purposes of	
14	promoting alumni relations and generating private donations for		
15	deposit into the University of Hawaii Foundation for the		
16	purposes of the university. Any expenditure authorized pursuan		
17	to this subsection shall be for a public purpose and shall not		
18	be subject to chapters 42F, 103, 103D, and 103F.—The universit		
19	shall submit a comprehensive report to the legislature detailing		
20	the use of any funds authorized by the board under this		
21	subsection no later than twenty days prior to the convening of		
22	each regular session.

9		identified in paragraph (1) by primary expense	
10		categories;	
11	(4)	Identify all moneys from the fund transferred to any	
12		fund of the university and provide a justification of	
13		how these moneys are used to benefit the university;	
14	(5)	Provide a financial summary of the operating	
15		activities of the University of Hawaii Foundation,	
16		including revenues and expenditures by major reporting	
17		categories; and	
18	(6)	Identify amounts and purposes of all expenditures from	
19		the University of Hawaii support fund.
