A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TELEHEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Advances in telecommunication technology have 1 2 radically changed the ways in which people relate to one another 3 and interact with the world around them. Time and distance, 4 once prohibitive obstacles to the ebb and flow of commerce and 5 communication, are no longer seen as the major impediments they 6 once were. Whether it is a consumer ordering goods from an internet vendor, business real-time teleconferencing, or 7 8 friendships forged across continents, telecommunication 9 technology impact all our lives.

10 One area in which advanced telecommunication technology has 11 made tremendous strides is in the development of telemedicine. 12 In the past, the physician-patient relationship was bound by in-13 office, face-to-face encounters. With the advent of advanced 14 telecommunication processes, an "office visit" can be an 15 electronic encounter. This is particularly important in rural 16 and medically underserved areas of the State where access to 17 medical care and services may be limited; where consultations 18 with medical specialists or utilization of specialized services HB LRB 10-0946.doc

1 could mean the difference between life and death; for first2 responders providing emergency care or disaster relief; and for
3 persons with chronic conditions requiring constant monitoring
4 while traveling or on extended leave.

5 The future of telecommunications in health care is almost 6 limitless. "Telemedicine" is generally associated with services 7 provided by physicians and surgeons; yet other health care 8 professionals could conceivably benefit from the use of · 9 telecommunications in their health care practices. The term 10 "telehealth" has been coined to encompass not only telemedicine, 11 but also services by these other professions, including nursing, 12 mental and behavioral health, speech language and audiology, dietitians, and occupational therapy. 13

14 Given the geographic isolation of our islands, as well as 15 the disparity of health care services between urban and rural 16 areas of the State, the legislature finds that Hawaii is ripe for the development and use of telehealth services for our 17 18 citizens. The legislature finds, however, that the concerns, as 19 well as the promises, of telehealth services must be 20 appropriately studied to ensure the safety and welfare of our 21 citizens and visitors alike.

10	(b)	The Hawaii medical board shall also review different
11	approache	s used by other states to incorporate telehealth
12	services	into their licensing laws. These options shall include
13	but not b	e limited to:
14	(1)	Exemption from licensure for services rendered by an
15		out-of-state physician to a patient in Hawaii;
16	(2)	Granting a Hawaii license by endorsement or effecting
17		reciprocity agreements with other states when an out-
18		of-state physician provides services to a patient in
19		Hawaii; and
20	(3)	Entering into interstate compacts that provide for a
21		special multi-state license to physicians while
22		providing telehealth services.

(c) The Hawaii medical board shall submit its findings,
 recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to the
 legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
 the regular session of 2011.
