A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LANDFILLS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Waimanalo Gulch
sanitary landfill, located on the leeward coast, is the only
existing landfill on Oahu capable of receiving the total daily
output of non-reusable municipal solid waste.

5 The legislature further finds that prior to the 6 establishment of the municipal solid waste landfill at Waimanalo 7 Gulch nineteen years ago, there were other municipal solid waste landfills that were operated on the leeward coast. 8 The residents of the leeward coast have the continuing burden of 9 10 receiving all of Oahu's construction and demolition waste, 11 including asbestos, which is being deposited into a privately-12 owned landfill that is adjacent to and mauka of Nanakuli town. 13 Additionally, there may be other privately-owned landfills 14 planned or proposed for the leeward coast.

15 Besides the obvious health risks leeward coast residents 16 have suffered and continue to suffer (asthma, birth defects, and . 17 cancer) as a result of these landfills, they are also impacted 18 by other environmental concerns: the H-power plant, Campbell HB LRB 10-0887.doc Page 2

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1 Industrial Park, illegal landfills, abandoned military 2 ordnances, a disproportionately large number of homeless, and 3 horrendous daily traffic conditions. Every day, approximately four hundred trucks, many in the semi-tractor trailer category, 4 5 travel to and from privately-owned landfills or other business establishments adding significantly to the traffic on Farrington 6 7 Highway. Accordingly, the legislature finds that there would be 8 significant and almost unbearable gridlock for leeward coast 9 residents daily if another landfill were opened.

10 The purpose of this Act is to prohibit the construction of 11 any new landfills, whether green waste landfills or otherwise, 12 or the expansion of any existing private solid waste landfill on 13 the leeward coast from Kaena Point to Waimanalo Gulch on or 14 after August 1, 2010.

15 SECTION 2. Chapter 342H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by adding a new section to part IV to be appropriately 17 designated and to read as follows:

18 "<u>\$342H-</u> Leeward coast landfills; prohibition. Any law 19 to the contrary notwithstanding, no person, including any 20 government agency or entity, shall construct or operate a new 21 solid waste landfill, including a municipal solid waste

22 landfill, green waste landfill, or otherwise, or expand any



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1	existing private solid waste landfill, or any component thereof,
2	on or after August 1, 2010, on the leeward coast of Oahu from
3	Kaena Point to Waimanalo Gulch. This section shall not apply to
4	the Waimanalo Gulch sanitary landfill.
5	For purposes of this section, "new solid waste landfill"
6	means any solid waste landfill that has not received waste prior
7	to August 1, 2010."
8	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
9	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon approval.
