### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SUSTAINABILITY.

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### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. During the 2005 special session, the legislature adopted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005 2 (Act 8), to create the Hawaii 2050 task force to review the 3 4 Hawaii state plan and the State's planning process. The office of the auditor was required to prepare and submit to the 5 6 legislature the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan. In enacting 7 Act 8, the legislature expressed its belief that government is 8 responsible for resolving daily and immediate issues and public needs, while providing guidance to assure a sustainable future 9 10 and outlook.

The creation of the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan comes 11 12 as the State faces a growing number of pressing issues, including the steady deterioration of public infrastructure, the 13 lack of affordable housing, a continued reliance on a service-14 based economy, the vulnerability of Hawaii in a volatile global 15 16 energy market, possible interruptions in travel and to critical 17 food supplies, threats to fragile island ecosystems, ever-18 increasing numbers of residents, and an increasing number of

1 visitors over the long-term. These issues all raise questions 2 about the long-term limits of growth in the State and motivate 3 the need to begin planning and action to assure Hawaii's future. 4 Clearly, a policy framework to establish sustainability as 5 a state priority and ensure a coordinated and coherent approach to fulfilling the long-range vision for a sustainable Hawaii is 6 The mission of the Hawaii 2050 task force and the 7 needed. 8 objectives of the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan focus on the 9 revitalization of the State's long-term planning process to 10 better guide the future development of Hawaii. Addressing and solving issues critical to Hawaii's way of life and natural 11 12 resources requires coordinated community efforts to produce 13 comprehensive, long-range planning policies and actions.

In 2008, the legislature adopted Act 225, Session Laws of Hawaii 2008, asking the University of Hawaii at Manoa college of social sciences public policy center to review the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan and provide a definitive framework for policy makers including defined data, data sources, and benchmarks for each of the major goals.

20 The purpose of this Act is to implement the recommendations
21 of the Hawaii 2050 update report, commissioned by Act 225,
22 Session Laws of Hawaii 2008, to establish sustainability as a

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state priority by adopting the Hawaii 2050 sustainability 1 2 definitions, quiding principles, and goals. SECTION 2. Chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 3 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 4 to read as follows: 5 . 2050 SUSTAINABILITY POLICY 6 "PART 7 §226-A Findings and purpose. In 2005, the legislature enacted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005, to create 8 the Hawaii 2050 task force to review the Hawaii state plan and 9 develop sustainability policies to address the vital needs of 10 11 the State through the year 2050. The office of the auditor was required to prepare and submit to the legislature the Hawaii 12 2050 sustainability plan. 13 14 The task force developed a comprehensive sustainability 15 plan that included quiding principles and five major goals for Hawaii 2050. 16 The purpose of this part is to set forth the Hawaii 2050 17 sustainability policy, which shall serve as a guide for the 18 19 future long-range sustainability planning of the State. 20 §226-B Definitions. As used in this part, the following 21 words and terms shall have the following meanings unless the 22 context indicates another meaning or intent:



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1	"Ahu	puaa" means a traditional native Hawaiian resource and	
2	behavioral management system that ensures respect for the air,		
3	land, water, and other scarce natural resources that make life

5	"Kanaka maoli" means native Hawaiians.		
6	<b>§226-C Sustainability; guiding principles.</b> (a) As a		
7	result of a statewide community effort and engagement process,		
8	it was revealed that most Hawaii residents desire a balance		
9	between economic, cultural, and environmental concerns. Thus,		
10	sustainability in Hawaii is defined as a Hawaii that achieves		
11	the following:		
12	(1)	Respects the culture, character, beauty, and history	
13		of the State's island communities;	
14	(2)	Strikes a balance between economic, social and	
15		community, and environmental priorities; and	
16	(3)	Meets the needs of the present without compromising	
17		the ability of future generations to meet their own	
18		needs.	
19	(b)	The following principles or values are established as	
20	the overall theme of sustainability policy:		
21	(1)	To balance economic, social, community, and	
22		environmental priorities;	
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1	(2)	To respect and live within the natural resources and
2		limits of the State;
3	(3)	To achieve a diversified and dynamic economy;
4	(4)	To honor the host culture;
5	(5)	To make decisions based on meeting the needs of the
6		present without compromising the needs of future
7		generations;
8	(6)	To observe the principles of the ahupuaa system to
9		guide resource management decisions; and
10	(7)	To emphasize that everyone, including individuals,
11		families, communities, businesses, and government, has
12		the responsibility for achieving a sustainable Hawaii.
13	§226	-D Sustainability goals. There are established five
14	major goa	ls that are designed to achieve a preferred future by
15	the year	2050, which shall include the following:
16	(1)	A way of life in which living sustainably is a part of
17		daily practice in Hawaii;
18	(2)	A diversified and globally competitive economy that
19		will enable residents to live, work, and play
20		meaningfully in Hawaii;

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1	(3)	Responsible and respectful use, replenishment, and

4	(4)	A community that is strong, healthy, vibrant, and
