Report Title: Identity Theft

### Description:

Amends the identity theft offenses and the definition of "personal information" in chapter 708, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to clarify that the identity theft offenses include the transmission of personal information of an actual person, alive or dead, or a fictitious person.

PURPOSE:

To clarify that the identity theft offenses include the transmission of personal information of an actual person, alive or

dead, or a fictitious person.

**MEANS:** 

Amend sections 708-800, 708-839.6(1), 708-839.7(1), and 708-839.8(1), Hawaii

Revised Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION:

This bill is intended to address the Hawaii Supreme Court decision in State v. Woodfall, 120 Haw. 387 (2009), where the Court found a conflict in the terms "another" and "personal information" in section 708-839.7, of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Although the definition of "personal information" includes the information of either an actual or fictitious person, the use of the phrase "personal information of another" in the statute was interpreted by the Court to refer only to the information of an actual person. By making that ruling, the Court concluded that Identity Theft in the Second Degree, in violation of section 708-839.7, requires the transmission of personal information of an actual person, not a fictitious person. This bill resolves the conflict and clarifies that identify theft offenses may involve the transmission of personal information of a fictitious person. It also makes it clear that identity theft offenses may also involve the use of the personal information of someone who has died.

Impact on the public: This bill will clarify the prohibited conduct in identity theft offenses. It will also help to protect victims of theft by offenders who

use the personal information of fictitious

persons.

Impact on the department and other agencies: This bill will allow state and county law enforcement officers and prosecutors to pursue cases of identity theft involving offenders who use fictitious personal information or the personal information of dead persons to commit crimes against

others.
