# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the most recent
information on the use of drugs, alcohol, and tobacco reveals a
disturbing rise in the use of these substances among the native
Hawaiian population and, in particular, by native Hawaiian
youth. In fact, among students in the eighth and tenth grades,
native Hawaiian children rank highest among all ethnic groups in
the use of these substances.

8 The legislature further finds that multiple health and 9 social problems, including poverty, crime, homelessness, and 10 family violence, are linked to an increased use of both legal 11 and illegal substances. The department of human services has 12 noted that up to eighty-five per cent of adults involved in the 13 child protective services system have serious substance abuse 14 problems. Further, parents and adult caregivers who are 15 substance abusers may also place their children at risk for 16 substance abuse.

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treatment and intervention programs that take a holistic
approach based upon cultural identity, spirituality, and
strength to get to the core--the why--of substance abuse, and to
heal from within.

5 The legislature finds that a pu'uhonua, or wellness center, 6 would be based on the Hawaiian paradigms of ho'oponopono (to make 7 right) and aloha 'aina (caring for the land). Ho'oponopono is a 8 focused approach to problem solving and a way to restore and 9 maintain a person's relationships with family and community. 10 Aloha 'aina, with its core of sustainable living, connects a 11 person to the world around the person.

12 The legislature further finds that the site formerly used 13 as the Kulani minimum security prison in East Hawaii would be an 14 ideal site for such a wellness center. It is a place of deep 15 spirituality for the Hawaiian people and, pragmatically, it has 16 the infrastructure and historical precedent for use in 17 sustainable living.

18 SECTION 2. The department of public safety, working with 19 Ohana Ho'opakele and other restorative justice groups, is 20 directed to prepare a plan for the creation of a pu'uhonua, or 21 wellness center, on lands owned or controlled by the State,



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giving preference to the site formerly used as the Kulani
correctional facility on the island of Hawaii.

The department of public safety shall report its findings and recommendations, including any budget requests necessary to achieve the purposes of this Act, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2011.

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SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
