A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that section 37-52.3, 2 Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires all special funds to reflect a 3 clear nexus between the benefits sought and the charges made 4 upon the users or beneficiaries of programs supported by the 5 fund, as opposed to serving primarily as a means of providing the programs or users with an automatic stream of support that 6 7 is removed from the normal budget and appropriations process. The legislature further finds that there is a need to 8 9 clarify the nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users and beneficiaries of the environmental health 10 11 education fund. The fund is the depository of fees collected by 12 the department of health for permits, licenses, inspections, 13 various certificates, variances, investigations, and reviews 14 respecting:

(1) Certain occupations, practices, and persons that the
 department deems necessary to regulate for public
 health or safety reasons under section 321-13, Hawaii
 Revised Statutes, including clinical laboratory
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1	directors, scientists, specialists, and technicians;		
2	cytotechnologists; tattoo artists; and environmental		
3	health professionals; and		
4	(2) Facilities seeking licensure or certification,		
5	including hospitals, nursing homes, freestanding		
6	outpatient surgical facilities, care centers,		
7	laboratories, and special treatment centers, as		
8	provided in section 321-11.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes.		
9	Section 321-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires the		
10	department of health to use the moneys in the environmental		
11	health education fund to enhance the capacity of the		
12	environmental health programs.		
13	The legislature further finds that over ninety per cent of		
14	the fees deposited into the environmental health education fund		
15	are collected by the sanitation branch of the department of		
16	health's environmental health services division. The sanitation		
17	branch is charged with implementing programs related to:		
18	(1) Food protection;		
19	(2) The regulation of barber shops, beauty parlors,		
20	massage parlors, tattoo shops, mortuaries, public		
21	swimming pools, and public laundries;		

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(3) The inspection of tenement houses, lodging houses, and boarding houses;

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3 (4) The licensing of tattoo artists and embalmers; and

4 (5) Enforcing the sanitation requirements for hospitals5 and medical facilities.

6 While the legislature recognizes the importance of
7 providing a dedicated source of funding for environmental health
8 education activities, the legislature acknowledges that, in this
9 case, the fees collected should directly benefit the fee payers.
10 The purpose of this Act is to:

- 11 (1) Change the name of the environmental health education
 12 fund to the sanitation and environmental health
 13 special fund; and
- 14 (2) Allow the use of fund money for sanitation program15 activities.

SECTION 2. Section 321-11.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

18 "(c) Other than the fees collected under subsection (b),
19 all other fees collected under this section and section 321-15
20 shall be deposited into the <u>sanitation and</u> environmental health
21 [education] special fund established under section 321-27."

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SECTION 3. Section 321-15, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 1 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 2 Every person holding a license to practice any 3 "(a) occupation specified in section 321-13(a)(1) shall reregister 4 with the department of health every other year in accordance 5 6 with the rules of the department, before February 1 except where superseded by federal law, and shall pay a reregistration fee. 7 8 The failure, neglect, or refusal of any person holding [such] a 9 license to reregister or pay the reregistration fee, after 10 thirty days of delinquency, shall constitute a forfeiture of the 11 person's license; provided that the license shall be restored 12 upon written application therefor together with a payment of all 13 delinguent fees and an additional late reregistration fee that 14 may be established by the director of health. All fees 15 collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited into the 16 sanitation and environmental health [education] special fund 17 established under section 321-27."

18 SECTION 4. Section 321-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 19 amended to read as follows:

20 "\$321-27 [Environmental] Sanitation and environmental
21 health [education] special fund. (a) There is established

 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2010.

Changes the name of the Environmental Health Education Fund to the Sanitation and Environmental Health Special Fund and allows the funds to be used for sanitation program activities and functions, including hiring of inspectors; increases the amount that can be used for administrative costs and the amount that the fund may accumulate before the excess is transferred into the general fund.
