A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE CREATION OF A PILOT PROJECT FOR AN OCEAN MASTER PLAN.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that user conflicts, 2 economic exploitation and unlicensed operators are creating 3 problems in the coastal waters surrounding Hawai`i. The user 4 conflicts in the ocean present a grave challenge to the good 5 people of Hawai`i. While these problems sometimes manifest 6 themselves in verbal conflict, at unfortunate times, user 7 conflicts can end in tragedy, as was the case with the tragic passing of diver Keahi Lum in 2009 due to a speedboat running 8 9 over him and his warning buoy and flag at Maunalua Bay. In the 10 past, such problems have been dealt with peacefully through 11 legislation. However, these legislative solutions have often 12 times been "piecemeal" in form. A more effective approach is 13 for the State and counties to address these issues by zoning 14 ocean areas out to the state water limits in the same way land 15 use is zoned. Indeed, the State has recognized the necessity of 16 a more integrated approach in the form of the Hawaii Ocean

1 Resources Management Plan, a model developed through the 2 concerted efforts of several state agencies. 3 The time has long since come to recognize the brilliance of 4 the ancient Hawaiians' ahupua`a system, in which three area 5 types - the mountains, the plains, and the sea - are considered 6 united by the flowing water of our streams. Not only did the 7 ancient Hawaiians' utilize their land resources intelligently, 8 they also extended the concept of use to the near-shore ocean 9 waters. 10 Unlike zoning on land, where one of the primary functions 11 is setting parameters for the use of private property, ocean 12 zoning serves to govern access to areas that are held in common. The oceans are a public resource - yet one that is subject to 13 14 increasing demand for a wide range of uses, many of which are 15 private enterprises that are considered to have public value: 16 food production, energy production, communications and 17 transportation, to name a few. Not least in the list is the legitimate use of targeted areas for biodiversity conservation, 18 19 including greater management emphasis on fully protected marine 20 reserves.

In consideration of the profusion of disparate andconflicting uses of ocean waters surrounding Hawai`i, the

1 recommendations forwarded in the Hawaii ocean resources 2 Management Plan, and the wisdom of the ahupua`a system, the 3 legislature finds that the department of land and natural 4 resources is the appropriate agency to design and administer, 5 through a newly created ocean zoning board, a comprehensive 6 Ocean Zoning Master Plan. However, in light of the current 7 budget situation, and the complexity of such an endeavor, it is 8 also the finding of the legislature that a scaled down pilot 9 project may be the more prudent approach. Accordingly, the 10 purpose of this Act is to lay the foundation of a comprehensive 11 Ocean Zoning Master Plan through a pilot project focusing on Maunalua Bay. 12

13 SECTION 2. As used in this Act, unless the context clearly 14 requires otherwise:

15 "Aha pua`a system," means the traditional system of 16 Hawaiian land division and management based on watershed 17 boundaries.

18 "Board" means the ocean board.

19 "Maunalua Bay" means the bay on the south side of Oahu
20 spanning from Kawaihoa (Koko Head Point/Portlock) to

21 Kupikipiki'o (Black Point/Wailupe Peninsula).

1 "Ocean waters" means all waters seaward of the shoreline 2 within jurisdiction of the State. 3 "Ocean zone" means a discrete area of ocean waters designated for particular uses, from the surface to the seabed, 4 5 and located within the region extending seaward from the 6 shoreline to the limit of the State's police power and 7 management authority; 8 "Ocean zoning" means the process of creating ocean zones. 9 "Ocean zoning master plan" means the comprehensive 10 statement in words, maps, or other permanent media of 11 communication, prepared, approved for submission by the State, 12 and which describes objectives, policies, laws, standards, and 13 procedures to guide and regulate public and private uses in 14 discrete ocean zones, provided however the "ocean zoning master 15 plan" is consistent with the intent, purpose, and provisions of 16 this chapter; 17 "Shoreline" means the upper reaches of the wash of the

18 waves, usually evidenced by the edge of vegetation growth or by 19 the upper limit of debris left by the wash of the waves.

20 SECTION 3. (a) There is established an ocean board to
21 be placed within the department of land and natural resources
22 for administrative purposes, as provided in section 26-35. The

1 officer. The executive officer shall be appointed by the board 2 and the executive officer's position shall be exempt from civil 3 service. Departments of the state government shall make 4 available to the board such data, facilities, and personnel as 5 are necessary for it to perform its duties. The board shall 6 adopt bylaws and rules in accordance with chapter 91 for its 7 organization, internal management, and to carry into effect its 8 purposes, powers, and programs.

9 SECTION 4. (a) As a precursor to a comprehensive ocean 10 zoning plan, the board shall develop and implement an ocean 11 zoning plan to protect ocean waters of Maunalua Bay and more 12 effectively plan for and manage development activity in the 13 ocean waters of Maunalua Bay based on the recommendations 14 articulated in the 2006 final report of the Hawaii ocean 15 resources management plan.

16 (b) The preparation of an ocean zoning master plan for
17 Maunalua Bay shall include, but not be limited to, the
18 following:

19 (1) Integration of the recommendations proposed in the
20 2006 final report of the Hawaii ocean resources
21 management plan;

1 the control of any development or other activities in 2 the Maunalua Bay ocean zone; 3 Identification of marine protected areas, to protect (6) areas of special, sensitive, and unique estuarine and 4 5 marine habitat and life (marine mammals, birds, 6 reptiles, soft corals, and other bottom dwelling 7 plants and animals), physical or submerged cultural 8 resources, the protection of important fisheries and 9 fishing activities from other uses, and the protection 10 and study of marine biodiversity and ecosystems; 11 (7) An implementation strategy that specifies the 12 arrangement that will ensure effective application of 13 the identified management measures within the Maunalua 14 Bay ocean zone. All offices of the department of land 15 and natural resources, and all other agencies, 16 departments, divisions, units, commissions, boards and 17 authorities of the State and counties shall enforce 18 laws and regulations within their jurisdiction, 19 conduct regulatory reviews, administer programs, 20 disburse funds, perform or supervise construction activities, or otherwise conduct their activities in a 21 22 manner that is consistent with the applicable

3		arrangements may include, as appropriate, memoranda of	
4		understanding or other instruments of agreement to	
5		ensure coordination between the board and all relevant
