A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENVIRONMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

	DE II ENACTED DI THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII.
1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State is
2	undergoing a significant and possibly protracted economic
3	downturn in tandem with the national and global economic and
4	financial crises. Numerous jobs have been lost, a number of
5	large and small companies have declared bankruptcy or left the
6	state, and many families have suffered foreclosure on their
7	heavily mortgaged houses. In the past year, the forecasts of
8	the council on revenues have consistently reduced the projected
9	tax revenues the State is expected to receive. Across-the-board
10	spending restrictions have already been put in place in state
11	government and a general hiring freeze has already been
12	implemented except in areas that impact public health and
13	safety.
14	In recognition of the situation throughout the United
15	States, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009,

16 Public Law No. 111-5, a federal economic stimulus package of aid

17 for distribution to the states, has been enacted. In

- 1 puts a focus on the creation of a clean energy economy and green
- 2 technology, the legislature finds that it is necessary to
- 3 identify and develop a framework for action to establish
- 4 partnerships and seek opportunities to develop a highly skilled
- 5 and well-trained workforce to meet the needs of an emerging
- 6 green economy sector.
- 7 Following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, the
- 8 emergency environmental workforce was created within the
- 9 research corporation of the University of Hawaii to employ
- 10 persons who lost their jobs in the subsequent economic downturn.
- 11 The legislature finds that a similar emergency workforce
- 12 development program is again required to provide employment and
- 13 retraining for persons affected by the current recession. The
- 14 legislature further finds that this program may be funded by the
- 15 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- 16 Furthermore, through the Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative, in
- 17 partnership with the United States Department of Energy, Hawaii
- 18 is becoming a recognized national and international leader in
- 19 addressing issues like climate change, renewable energy, energy-
- 20 efficiency, and alternative transportation fuels to not only
- 21 stabilize its economy, but also to enhance and protect its
- 22 natural resources and environment. Hawaii's on-going efforts

10		with workforce development training opportunities;
11	(2)	Developing public, private, philanthropic, and
12		nongovernmental partnerships to build and expand the
13		state's green workforce development programs, network,
14		and infrastructure;
15	(3)	Providing policy guidance for job training programs in
16		the clean energy and green technology sectors to
17		assist and prepare targeted populations such as
18		displaced workers, veterans, or at-risk groups;
19	(4)	Developing, collecting, interpreting, and distributing
20		state and county labor market data on clean energy and

4	(6)	Establishing an emergency environmental workforce for
5		short-term employment for individuals who have

7		economic downturn. Individuals on the workforce will
8		assist the efforts to:
9		(A) Eradicate invasive species; and
10		(B) Carry out other ongoing environmental programs.
11	SECT	ION 2. The department of business, economic
12	developme	nt, and tourism shall identify and develop a policy
13	framework	strategy for action to establish partnerships and seek
14	opportuni	ties to develop the highly skilled and well-trained
15	"green co	llar" workforce needed for an emerging "green economy"
16	sector.	In formulating the strategy, the department shall:
17	(1)	Identify and link green collar job opportunities with
18		workforce development training opportunities;
19	(2)	Develop public, private, philanthropic, and
20		nongovernmental partnerships to build and expand the
21		state's green workforce development programs, network,
22		and infrastructure;

1	(3)	Provide policy guidance for job training programs in
2		the clean energy and green technology sectors to
3		assist and prepare targeted populations such as
4		displaced workers, veterans, or at-risk groups;
5	(4)	Develop, collect, interpret, and distribute state and
6		county labor market data on clean energy and green
7		industry workforce needs, trends, and job growth; and
8	(5)	Assist collaboration of the counties in the
9		development of the clean energy and green industry
10		workforce sector.
11	SECT	ION 3. There is established the emergency
12	environme	ntal workforce to be attached to the research
13	corporation	on of the University of Hawaii for administrative
14	purposes.	The emergency environmental workforce shall:
15	(1)	Employ approximately four hundred to four hundred
16		fifty individuals who were terminated or laid off from
17		their jobs as a result of the local economic downturn.
18		The individuals shall be employed as short-term
19		contract employees; and
20	(2)	Deploy contract employees to all state or county
21		agencies certifying a need for environmental clearance
22		and eradication services to supplement current

.1		services being provided for the eradication of
2		invasive species or other ongoing environmental
3		improvement programs.
4	SECT	ION 4. In connection with the establishment under
5	section 3	of this Act of the emergency environmental workforce
6	program,	the research corporation of the University of Hawaii
7	shall:	
8	(1)	Together with the Pacific cooperative studies unit of
9		the University of Hawaii, develop a planning,
10		administration, implementation, and evaluation
11		strategy, including a program duration plan and a
12		budget for contract and administrative expenses;
13	(2)	Consult with private employers whose workforces have
14		been, or that may be, affected by layoffs from the
15		recent economic downturn to develop a recruitment and
16		public information plan;
17	(3)	Develop a strategy for the interviewing and selection
18		of emergency environmental workforce program
19		participants;
20	(4)	Work with state and county agencies requesting
21		services to administer physical examinations, as may

1		be necessary, to qualifying applicants prior to final
2		contract offers;
3	(5)	Direct that the attorneys employed or retained by the
4		University of Hawaii prepare the necessary employment
5		contracts to meet the objectives of the emergency
6		environmental workforce program on an expedited basis;
7	(6)	Submit review and assessment reports to the governor,
8		the president of the senate, and the speaker of the
9		house of representatives every sixty days for the
10		duration of the program; and
11	(7)	Undertake all other necessary activities for
12		development and implementation of the emergency
13		environmental workforce program.
14	SECT	ION 5. There is appropriated out of federal funds
15	received 1	by the State from the American Recovery and
16	Reinvestm	ent Act of 2009 and any other applicable federal acts
17	the sum o	f \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for
18	fiscal ye	ar 2009-2010 for the department of business, economic
19	developme	nt, and tourism to identify and develop a policy
20	framework	strategy for action to establish partnerships and seek
21	funding o	pportunities to develop the highly skilled and well-

- 1 trained "green collar" workforce needed for an emerging "green

- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes of
- 5 this Act.
- 6 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of federal funds
- 7 received by the State from the American Recovery and
- 8 Reinvestment Act of 2009 and any other applicable federal acts
- 9 the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for
- 10 fiscal year 2009-2010 to fund the emergency environmental
- 11 workforce created by this Act.
- 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
- 13 corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this
- 14 Act.
- 15 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.

Description:

Appropriates federal funds from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 to develop the highly skilled and well-trained green collar workforce needed by Hawaii's emerging green economy sector and to implement the Emergency Environmental Workforce Program. (HB281 HD3)
