# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENVIRONMENT.

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### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State is
2	undergoing a significant and possibly protracted economic
3	downturn in tandem with the national and global economic and
4	financial crises. Numerous jobs have been lost, a number of
5	large and small companies have declared bankruptcy or left the
6	state, and many families have suffered foreclosure on their
7	heavily mortgaged houses. In the past year, the forecasts of
8	the council on revenues have consistently reduced the projected
9	tax revenues the State is expected to receive. Across-the-board
10	spending restrictions have already been put in place in state
11	government and a general hiring freeze has already been
12	implemented except in areas that impact public health and
13	safety.
14	In recognition of the situation throughout the United
15	States, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009,
16	Public Law No. 111-5, a federal economic stimulus package of aid
17	for distribution to the states, has been enacted. In
18	anticipation of receiving some of these federal funds, which

- 1 puts a focus on the creation of a clean energy economy and green
- 2 technology, the legislature finds that it is necessary to
- 3 identify and develop a framework for action to establish
- 4 partnerships and seek opportunities to develop a highly skilled
- 5 and well-trained workforce to meet the needs of an emerging
- 6 green economy sector.
- 7 Following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, the
- 8 emergency environmental workforce was created within the
- 9 research corporation of the University of Hawaii to employ
- 10 persons who lost their jobs in the subsequent economic downturn.
- 11 The legislature finds that a similar emergency workforce
- 12 development program is again required to provide employment and
- 13 retraining for persons affected by the current recession. The
- 14 legislature further finds that this program may be funded by the
- 15 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- 16 Furthermore, through the Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative, in
- 17 partnership with the United States Department of Energy, Hawaii
- 18 is becoming a recognized national and international leader in
- 19 addressing issues like climate change, renewable energy, energy-
- 20 efficiency, and alternative transportation fuels to not only
- 21 stabilize its economy, but also to enhance and protect its
- 22 natural resources and environment. Hawaii's on-going efforts

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- 1 that include an aggressive environmental workforce to address
- 2 invasive species eradication, watershed management, and a clean
- 3 energy economy provide an opportunity for Hawaii to develop a
- 4 "green collar" workforce.
- 5 The purpose of this Act is to prioritize the expenditure of
- 6 appropriate federal economic stimulus packages of aid in
- 7 developing the highly skilled and well-trained "green collar"
- 8 workforce needed by Hawaii's emerging "green economy" sector,
- 9 including:
- 10 (1) Identifying and linking green collar job opportunities
- with workforce development training opportunities;
- 12 (2) Developing public, private, philanthropic, and
- nongovernmental partnerships to build and expand the
- state's green workforce development programs, network,
- and infrastructure;
- 16 (3) Providing policy guidance for job training programs in
- the clean energy and green technology sectors to
- 18 assist and prepare targeted populations such as
- displaced workers, veterans, or at-risk groups;
- 20 (4) Developing, collecting, interpreting, and distributing
- 21 state and county labor market data on clean energy and

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1		green industry workforce needs, trends, and job
2		growth;
3	(5)	Assisting collaboration of the counties in the
4		development of the clean energy and green industry
5		workforce sector; and
6	(6)	Establishing an emergency environmental workforce for
7		short-term employment for individuals who have
8		recently become unemployed due to Hawaii's recent
9		economic downturn. Individuals on the workforce will
10		assist the efforts to:
11		(A) Eradicate invasive species; and
12		(B) Carry out other ongoing environmental programs.
13	SECT	ION 2. The department of business, economic
14	developme	nt, and tourism shall identify and develop a policy
15	framework	strategy for action to establish partnerships and seek
16	opportuni	ties to develop the highly skilled and well-trained
17	"green co	llar" workforce needed for an emerging "green economy"
18	sector.	In formulating the strategy, the department shall:
19	(1)	Identify and link green collar job opportunities with
20		workforce development training opportunities;
21	(2)	Develop public, private, philanthropic, and

1		state's green workforce development programs, network,
2		and infrastructure;
3	(3)	Provide policy guidance for job training programs in
4		the clean energy and green technology sectors to
5		assist and prepare targeted populations such as
6		displaced workers, veterans, or at-risk groups;
7	(4)	Develop, collect, interpret, and distribute state and
8		county labor market data on clean energy and green
9		industry workforce needs, trends, and job growth; and
10	(5)	Assist collaboration of the counties in the
11		development of the clean energy and green industry
12		workforce sector.
13	SECT	ION 3. There is established the emergency
14	environme	ntal workforce to be attached to the research
15	corporation	on of the University of Hawaii for administrative
16	purposes.	The emergency environmental workforce program shall:
17	(1)	Provide support and prevent layoffs in existing
18		environmental programs;
19	(2)	Employ approximately four hundred to four hundred
20		fifty individuals who were terminated or laid off from
21		their jobs as a result of the local economic downturn.

1		The individuals shall be employed as short-term
2		employees; and
3	(3)	Deploy employees to all state or county agencies
4		certifying a need for environmental clearance and
5		eradication services to supplement current services
6		being provided for the eradication of invasive species
7		or other ongoing environmental improvement programs.
8	SECT	ION 4. (a) In connection with the establishment under
9	section 3	of this Act of the emergency environmental workforce
10	program,	the research corporation of the University of Hawaii
11	shall:	
12	(1)	Together with the Pacific cooperative studies unit of
13		the University of Hawaii, develop a planning,
14		administration, implementation, and evaluation
15		strategy, including a program duration plan and a
16		budget for contract and administrative expenses;
17	(2)	Consult with private employers whose workforces have
18		been, or that may be, affected by layoffs from the
19		recent economic downturn to develop a recruitment and
20		<pre>public information plan;</pre>

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1	(3)	Develop a strategy for the interviewing and selection
2		of emergency environmental workforce program
3		participants;
4	(4)	Work with state and county agencies requesting
5		services to administer physical examinations, as may
6		be necessary, to qualifying applicants prior to final
7		offers;
8	(5)	Submit review and assessment reports to the governor,
9		the president of the senate, and the speaker of the
10		house of representatives every sixty days for the
11		duration of the program; and
12	(6)	Undertake all other necessary activities for
13		development and implementation of the emergency
14		environmental workforce program.
15	(b)	In connection with the establishment under section 3
16	of this A	ct of the emergency environmental workforce program,
17	the emplo	yees described in section 3(2) and (3) of this Act
18	shall be	subject to the research corporation of the University
19	of Hawaii	's policies and procedures relating to employment;
20	provided	that any applicable unemployment insurance coverage for
21	such empl	oyees shall be the responsibility of the State of

- 2 the applicable research corporation of the University of Hawaii
- 3 policies.
- 4 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of federal funds
- 5 received by the State from the American Recovery and
- 6 Reinvestment Act of 2009 and any other applicable federal acts
- 7 the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for
- 8 fiscal year 2009-2010 for the department of business, economic
- 9 development, and tourism to identify and develop a policy
- 10 framework strategy for action to establish partnerships and seek
- 11 funding opportunities to develop the highly skilled and well-
- 12 trained "green collar" workforce needed for an emerging "green
- 13 economy" sector as required by this Act.
- 14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 15 business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes of
- 16 this Act.
- 17 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of federal funds
- 18 received by the State from the American Recovery and
- 19 Reinvestment Act of 2009 and any other applicable federal acts
- 20 the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for
- 21 fiscal year 2009-2010 to fund the emergency environmental
- 22 workforce created by this Act.

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- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
- 2 corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this
- 3 Act.
- 4 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2009.

### Report Title:

Green Collar Workforce; Emergency Environmental Workforce

## Description:

Appropriates federal funds from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 to develop and retain the highly skilled and well-trained green collar workforce needed by Hawaii's emerging green economy sector and to implement the Emergency Environmental Workforce Program. (SD1)
