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### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Like all other public airports throughout the 2 United States, security at Hawaii's public airports has changed 3 dramatically since the tragic events of September 11, 2001. 4 Following these events, the federal government formed the 5 Transportation Security Administration (TSA) which now conducts 6 various oversight as to security matters and screenings at all 7 public airports, including airports in Hawaii. TSA and other federal agencies monitor the security programs at Hawaii's 8 9 airports and at times each year issue various changes, including 10 new security requirements, to improve these programs. Hawaii's 11 department of transportation (DOT) is then required to adhere to 12 these changes and ensure that its public and private security 13 forces follow these directives.

Much of Hawaii's security program, and the directives from TSA and other federal agencies, are often deemed confidential for security reasons. Thus, the disclosure of details of the program and federal directives to the general public and, in



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turn, possible terrorist organizations, is oftentimes
 prohibited.

3 Given these circumstances, it is problematic to require DOT 4 to follow the pre-September 11, 2001, practice of publicly 5 bidding and awarding its security contracts at Hawaii's airports 6 as DOT is prohibited from disclosing numerous federal 7 requirements to companies bidding on the contract. Thus, a 8 winning bidder will not be fully informed as to the federal 9 requirements and any costs associated with these requirements 10 until after the bidder has submitted its lowest-dollar amount 11 bid to provide security services. This can pose a problem as 12 costs associated with the federal requirements may cause a 13 winning bidder's bid to be unfeasible and may result in the 14 winning bidder to operate at a financial loss. While this is an 15 unfair situation for the bidder, it also raises a security 16 concern. A winning bidder may not be able to fulfill all the 17 requirements and levels of service required to secure Hawaii's airports due to the financial loss. This would put the security 18 19 of Hawaii's airports and safety of the general public in 20 jeopardy.

Allowing DOT to negotiate security-concession contracts for
its airports, just as various other concession contracts are



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1 negotiated at Hawaii's airports, would eliminate this problem. 2 DOT would be able to select a preferred provider and negotiate 3 the final costs and terms of the contract after full disclosure 4 of all confidential matters has been made. This process would 5 also serve to ensure that the security provider has the 6 financial capability to meet the requirements of the contract 7 and provide the necessary level of security services for 8 Hawaii's airports. 9 The purpose of this Act is to allow DOT to award its 10 security contracts by negotiations rather than by a bidding 11 process given the sensitive and confidential nature of such contracts and related matters. 12 SECTION 2. Section 102-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 14 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 15 The bidding requirements of subsection (a) shall not "(b) 16 apply to concessions or space on public property set aside for 17 the following purposes: 18 (1) For operation of ground transportation services and 19 parking lot operations at airports, except for motor 20 vehicle rental operations under chapter 437D; 21 (2) For lei vendors;

22 (3) For airline and aircraft operations;

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1	(4)	For automatic teller machines and vending machines,
2		except vending machines located at public schools
3		operated by blind or visually handicapped persons in
4		accordance with section 302A-412;
5	(5)	For operation of concessions set aside without any
6		charge;
7	(6)	For operation of concessions by handicapped or blind
8		persons; except concessions operated in the public
9		schools by blind or visually handicapped persons in
10		accordance with section 302A-412;
11	(7)	For operation of concessions on permits revocable on
12		notice of thirty days or less; provided that no such
13		permits shall be issued for more than a [ <del>one year</del> ]
14		<u>one-year</u> period;
15	(8)	For operation of concessions or concession spaces for
16		a beach service association dedicated to the
17		preservation of the Hawaii beach boy tradition,
18		incorporated as a nonprofit corporation in accordance
19		with state law, and whose members are appropriately
20		licensed or certified as required by law;
21	(9)	For operation of concessions at county zoos, botanic
22		gardens, or other county parks which are



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1		environmentally, culturally, historically, or
2		operationally unique and are supported, by nonprofit
3		corporations incorporated in accordance with state law
4		solely for purposes of supporting county aims and
5		goals of the zoo, botanic garden, or other county
6		park, and operating under agreement with the
7		appropriate agency solely for such purposes, aims, and
8		goals;
9	(10)	For operation of concessions that furnish goods or
10		services for which there is only one source, as
11		determined by the head of the awarding government
12		agency in writing that shall be included in the
13		contract file;
14	(11)	For operation of concession or concession spaces at
15		the convention center under chapter 201B; [and]
16	(12)	For any of the operations of the Hawaii health systems
17		corporation and its regional system boards $[+]$ ; and
18	(13)	For any security concession or security operation at
19		airports."



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SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
