A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Hawaii has the highest rate of drowning in the
- 2 country at an annual average of almost two and one-half victims
- 3 for every one hundred thousand residents who drown in the
- 4 State's ocean waters, lakes, dams and reservoirs, rainwater
- 5 retention and detention ponds, flood waters, swimming pools,
- 6 spas, and private homes. The rate more than doubles when
- 7 including visitor statistics, making it the nation's riskiest
- 8 destination in terms of water safety.
- 9 Hawaii's keiki are the most vulnerable to drowning, which
- 10 in this State, and nine others, is the leading cause of death
- 11 among children aged fourteen and younger. Among children under
- 12 age five, drowning accidents in swimming pools are the leading
- 13 cause of injury and death, while Hawaii's older keiki are more
- 14 vulnerable to drowning in the ocean, lakes, ponds, dams and
- 15 reservoirs, rainwater catchments, as well as retention ponds.
- 16 Retention ponds are meant to hold storm water, and
- 17 rainwater catchments are similarly used to harvest runoff
- 18 rainwater. Unregulated and poorly maintained rainwater

| 1 | retention ponds pose a serious health and safety risk, |
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| 2 | particularly to Hawaii's children because these ponds are often |
| 3 | mistaken for recreational bodies of water. Risks may be lowered |
| 4 | by clearly marking these rainwater retention ponds with hazard |
| 5 | and warning signs that prohibit swimming and water sports. The |
| 6 | American Academy of Pediatrics and the Consumer Product Safety |
| 7 | Commission have recommended fencing to protect children from |
| 8 | circumventing adult supervision, and the State's injury |
| 9 | prevention panel have recommended four-sided isolation fencing |
| 10 | for residential pools to isolate them from the house or yard. |
| 11 | A statewide rainwater retention pond safety program, |
| 12 | including rules that balance the importance of regulating |
| 13 | rainwater retention ponds with proper safeguards to ensure |
| 14 | public safety, with the assurance of compliance by all public |
| 15 | agencies and private sector builders and developers may be |
| 16 | appropriate at this time. |
| 17 | The department of health is the logical agency to |
| 18 | incorporate a water safety program in its overall water safety |
| 19 | curriculum that: |

20 (1) Encourages and assists developers or persons

| 10 | | runoff; |
| 11 | (2) | Determine minimum safety requirements for the |
| 12 | | development and maintenance of retention ponds, |
| 13 | | including but not limited to proper borders, fencing, |
| 14 | | landscaping, sloping, and warning signs; |
| 15 | (3) | Determine the need for a periodic retention pond |
| 16 | | inspection program in the department of health or the |

| 18 | | budget projections for such a program; and |
| 19 | (4) | Consider any other relevant matters pertaining to the |
| 20 | | safety of retention ponds, |

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- 1 provided that retention ponds or other water hazards located on
- 2 golf courses shall not be included within the responsibility of
- 3 the task force.
- 4 (c) The task force shall submit its findings, including
- 5 any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than
- 6 twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of
- 7 2010.
- 8 (d) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2010.
- 9 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
