INTEREST TRANSFER PART II. SECTION 4. The purpose of this part is to provide for the 3 temporary transfer into the general fund of interest earned on 4 short-term investment or deposit of moneys of certain special 5 funds, revolving funds, and special accounts. 6 This part does not require the temporary transfer of any 7 fee or user charge collected from a beneficiary of a state service. It only provides for the temporary transfer of 9 interest earned on the unexpended fee or charge. Thus, the 10 legislature intends that this part be in conformance with state 11 judicial interpretation concerning the proper use of the 12 proceeds from a fee or user charge established by a state 13 agency. 14 SECTION 5. Temporary transfer of interest earned on 15 certain special funds, revolving funds, and special accounts to 16 general fund. (a) Notwithstanding any other law to the 17 contrary, from July 1, 2009, until June 30, 2015, the director 18 of finance shall deposit into the general fund the interest 19 earned on the short-term investment of moneys of the special

20 funds, revolving funds, and special accounts listed in this 21 subsection.
