A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AQUARIUM AQUATIC LIFE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 The legislature finds that the aquarium aquatic SECTION 1. 2 life collecting industry has operated for over fifty years 3 without limits or constraints on its catch or the number of 4 collectors in the State. 5 The aquarium industry focuses on juvenile reef fish and 6 small invertebrates and export eighty-two per cent of their 7 catch to the mainland United States. However, with expanding 8 Asian markets, collectors are targeting more remote and deeper 9 reefs as evidenced by the species sold on many internet 10 websites. Endemic species such as the bandit angelfish and the 11 masked angelfish sell for hundreds or even thousands of 12 dollars each, with no regulation or limit. 13 Home aquaria in China reflect the new prosperity there, 14 with large aquariums covering multiple walls that display adult 15 eels and other large animals from Hawaii's reefs. 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- 1 reef fish and invertebrates have complicated relationships to
- 2 the overall ecology of the reef. Their removal may affect the
- 3 long-term stability of these ecosystems. Significant population
- 4 declines and major shifts in species diversity are now evident
- 5 in coral reef areas where collection is occurring. The aquarium
- 6 catch is mostly herbivore. Their removal could result in
- 7 increased algal growth, due to a lack of grazers to keep the
- 8 algae in check, with a corresponding decrease in coral cover.
- 9 No constraint on collecting allows the industry to meet the
- 10 growing demand for color, shape, and rarity. The Hawaiian
- 11 cleaner wrasse is one of the most popular fish species
- 12 collected and is known for its radiant color and lively
- 13 movement. These fish pick parasites from many other fish, are
- 14 found nowhere else in the world, and are collected and shipped
- 15 without limitation daily. The Hawaiian cleaner wrasse will not
- 16 eat fish food in captivity and eventually dies of starvation.
- 17 Likewise, coral-eating butterfly fishes, prized by aquarists for
- 18 their beauty, starve in a short period of time.
- 19 The purpose of this Act is to enhance and improve the
- 20 regulation of aquarium aquatic life collecting to protect and
- 21 preserve Hawaii's aquatic life and marine environment.

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         SECTION 2. Chapter 188, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
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    and to read as follows:
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                   Aquarium aquatic life; collection. (a) As used

    in this section, unless the context requires otherwise:
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         "Aquarium collecting gear" means any equipment used to
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    collect aquarium fish or animals including, but not limited to,
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    hand nets, fence or barrier nets, fiberglass or metal "tickle
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    sticks", catch buckets, keeps, or baskets.
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         "Aquarium purpose" means to hold saltwater fish,
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    freshwater non-game fish, or other aquatic life alive in a
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    state of captivity as pets, for scientific study, or for public
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    exhibition or display, or for sale for these purposes.
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         "Collect" means to take, catch, harvest, confine, or to
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    attempt to take, catch, harvest, or confine aquatic life. The
    use of any aquarium collecting gear to take, catch, capture,
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    harvest, or confine, or to attempt to take, catch, capture,
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    harvest, or confine aquatic life by any person who is on or
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    about the shores of Hawaii or in a vessel in Hawaiian waters
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    shall be construed as collecting under this section.
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         "Department" means the department of land and natural
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resources.

3	(b)	The department shall develop and maintain an aquarium
4	collectin	ng white list of aquatic species for each county. No
5	aquatic s	species shall be collected or sold for aquarium
6	purposes	in the State unless the species appears on the aquarium
7	collecting	g white list of the county where the species is
8	collected	or sold.
9	(c)	The aquarium collecting white list shall only include
10	species th	hat are shown by an official, published department
11	or equiva	lent federal agency study that meets the following
12	<u>criteria:</u>	
13	(1)	The species can survive capture, transport, and
14		captivity for at least one hundred eighty days; and
15	(2)	Based on historical evidence, the specie is part of a
16		stable or increasing population trend in the area the
17		species is being collected.
18	(d)	In addition to the requirements of subsection (c), the
19	following	criteria shall apply:
20	(1)	The collection of the species in a county shall not
21		exceed the average annual collection in that county

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1		for the calendar years 2005 through 2007, based on
2		department collection reports for those years;
3	(2)	The removal of the specie does not negatively impact
4		the reef ecosystem by contributing to algae overgrowth
5		for herbivores, parasite overload on other reef fishes
6		for cleaner wrasses and cleaner shrimps, or other
7		harmful results; and
8	(3)	The specie is not endemic to Hawaii.
9	<u>(e)</u>	Native Hawaiian (kanaka maoli) traditional and
10	customary	rights with regard to marine resources for
11	subsisten	ce, cultural, or religious purposes may be recognized
12	pursuant	to rules adopted by the department.
13	(f)	The department shall inform all permit holders under
14	section 1	88-31 (both commercial and recreational), of the
15	species i	ncluded in the aquarium collecting white list and the
16	penalties	for failure to comply with the restrictions
17	regarding	g the collection of aquatic life.
18	(g)	Any person who collects or possesses aquatic life for
19	aquarium	purposes not on the aquarium collecting white list
20	shall be	fined \$1,000 for each specimen collected or possessed.

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1	(h) In addition to any other penalty or fine provided by
2	law, any person violating this section shall be sentenced as
3	follows:
4	(1) For a first violation, a fine of not more than \$1,000
5	or thirty days imprisonment, or both;
6	(2) For a second violation within five years of a
7	previous violation, a fine of not more than \$2,000 or
8	sixty days imprisonment, or both; and
9	(3) For a third or subsequent violation within five years
10	of a previous violation, a fine of not more than
11	\$3,000 or ninety days imprisonment, or both."
12	SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
13	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
14	begun, before its effective date.
15	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
16	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on June 1, 2009.
