A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPOSIT BEVERAGE CONTAINER PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	REVERSE VENDING MACHINE REBATE PROGRAM
3	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the deposit beverage
4	container program has encouraged increased recycling of glass,
5	plastic, and aluminum beverage containers in the State.
6	However, the legislature finds that more could be done to make
7	the recycling program easier and more accessible to the public,
8	thereby encouraging yet more recycling of containers. The
9	legislature also finds that access to recycling facilities may
10	be improved by increasing the number of redemption centers and
11	reverse vending machines that are available to the public.
12	Currently, the department of health offers a rebate to qualified
13	persons who install a reverse vending machine and maintain
14	operations as a redemption center. However, this rebate program
15	will expire on June 30, 2009. The legislature further finds
16	that recycling throughout the State may be increased by
17	extending the reverse vending machine rebate program and

1	Accordingly, the purpose of this part is to extend the		
2	reverse vending machine rebate program and increase the

4	SECTION 2. Section 342G-102.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

8	machine, including shipping and general excise tax, and up to		
9	per cent of the operating cost during the first two

- **10** (7) Who meets other criteria established by the director. 11 Notwithstanding paragraphs (1) and (2), the director may allow **12** the placement of redemption centers at greater than prescribed 13 distances to accommodate geographical features while ensuring 14
- 15 Regardless of the square footage of a dealer's place 16 of business, dealers who are not redemption centers shall post a 17 clear and conspicuous sign at the primary public entrance of the 18 dealer's place of business that specifies the name, address, and 19 hours of operation of the closest redemption center locations.

Description:
