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H.B. NO. 646

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Organic farming practices are beneficial to 1 2 human health and towards the preservation of environmental 3 quality because these practices emphasize sustainability, 4 enhance soil health, and promote the practice of growing 5 agricultural products without the use of toxic substances, such 6 as pesticides and fertilizers. While organic farming is an 7 important building block for maintaining and preserving the 8 State's scenic and environmental resources, it is also an 9 essential element in creating economic viability and preserving 10 the quality of life in rural and agricultural communities.

According to a national study, approximately two per cent of the United States food supply is grown using organic methods and the nationwide retail sales of organic food and beverages in 2005 totaled approximately \$12,800,000,000. There are over ninety organic farms in Hawaii, which produce organic products such as coffee, macadamia nuts, bananas, pineapples, ginger, mangoes, citrus fruits, avocados, tomatoes, and salad greens.



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The Hawaii Organic Farmers Association, an accredited third
 party certification agency for the United States Department of
 Agriculture's national organic program, estimates that organic
 farming is a \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 per year industry in
 Hawaii.

6 There is currently a high and increasing demand for organic 7 produce that exceeds the State's locally produced organic food 8 supply, and to meet this demand, local produce markets and large 9 mainland chain stores must import organic produce from the 10 mainland and other countries. The importation of organic 11 produce can result in a higher number of invasive species that 12 are inadvertently brought into the State upon arrival, and can 13 adversely impact the State's agriculture sector, economy, and 14 sustainable food supply.

15 The purpose of this Act is to establish an organic 16 agriculture task force under the administration of the 17 department of business, economic development, and tourism to 18 develop a business plan for the Hawaii organic food center, and 19 to appropriate funds for the task force to carry out its 20 purposes.

21 SECTION 2. (a) There is established within the department
22 of business, economic development, and tourism an organic



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1 agriculture task force to develop a business plan for the Hawaii 2 organic food center. 3 (b) The organic agriculture task force shall consist of 4 the following members: 5 The director of business, economic development, and (1)6 tourism or the director's designee; 7 The chairperson of the board of agriculture or the (2)8 chairperson's designee; 9 (3) Two members from the senate appointed by the senate 10 president; 11 (4)Two members from the house of representatives 12 appointed by the speaker of the house of 13 representatives; 14 The dean of the college of tropical agriculture and (5) 15 human resources at the University of Hawaii or the 16 dean's designee; 17 The executive director of the agribusiness development (6) 18 corporation or the executive director's designee; 19 (7) The president of the Hawaii Organic Farmers 20 Association or the president's designee; 21 The president of the Hawaii Cooperative of Organic (8)22 Farmers or the president's designee;

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1	(9)	The director of the Hawaii Agriculture Research Center
2		or the director's designee; and
3	(10)	The executive director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau
4		Federation.
5	(c)	The organic agriculture task force shall develop a
6	business	plan for the Hawaii organic food center, which shall
7	include e	vidence of its conceptual viability. The Hawaii
8	organic food center shall:	
9	(1)	Provide infrastructure support for the organic farming
10		industry;
11	(2)	Establish a multi-function, cooperative center on Oahu
12		with a value-added product line and distribution
13		center;
14	(3)	Establish operational organic farm land for fruit and
15		vegetable seed production; and
16	(4)	Conduct farm tours and host farmers markets.
17	(d)	The members of the organic agriculture task force
18	shall select the chairperson of the task force from among	
19	themselve	s and shall be reimbursed for expenses, including
20	travel ex	penses, necessary for the performance of their duties.
21	(e)	The organic agriculture task force shall submit its
22	business	plan to the legislature, including any necessary
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proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the 1 2 convening of the 2010 regular session.

3 (f) The department of business, economic development, and 4 tourism shall provide support services necessary to assist the 5 task force in achieving its purposes as required under this Act. 6 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$500,000 or so much 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 for the 9 organic agriculture task force to carry out the purposes of this 10 Act.

11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 12 business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes of 13 this Act.

14 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval; 15 provided that section 3 shall take effect on July 1, 2009.
