A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, with the budgetary				
2	authority and flexibility granted to the public schools, it is				
3	in the public interest to ensure responsiveness and				
4	accountability to the school community. To achieve this, the				
5	legislature believes it is necessary to enhance communication				
6	between various stakeholders and develop a system of decision				
7	making that is transparent to all interested parties.				
8	The purpose of this Act is to improve accountability and				
9	transparency in the public schools by:				
10	(1) Requiring the department of education, in its				
11	evaluation of the effectiveness of complex area				
12	superintendents and principals in supporting fiscal				
13	accountability, to include an evaluation of the				
14	accountability measures taken in regards to the use of				
15	resources by schools;				
16	(2) Requiring each principal to develop and present to the				

17 school community council the school budget process as

1 it aligns with the school's academic and financial
2 plans;

Requiring the board of education to develop a process 3 (3) for school community councils to appeal decisions made 4 by the principal to set aside council decisions; and 5 6 Requiring school principals to exercise various means (4)available, including electronic media and websites, to 7 8 engage and consult with teachers, parents, and students to solicit input and advice on the use of 9 money, positions, and other resources available to the 10 school. 11

12 SECTION 2. Section 302A-1004, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is13 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

14 "(a) The department shall implement a comprehensive system 15 of educational accountability to motivate and support the 16 improved performance of students and the education system. This 17 accountability system shall:

18 (1) Include student accountability; school or collective
19 accountability; individual professional accountability
20 for teachers, principals, and other employees; and
21 public accounting to parents, community members,

(2)	Link authority and resources to responsibility;
(3)	Define clear roles for all parties and lines of
	responsibility and mutual obligation and develop a
	collaborative process with stakeholders, including
	representatives of appropriate bargaining units,
	parents, administration, and students;
(4)	Assess and track measures of academic achievement,
	safety and well-being, and civic responsibility of
	individual students at selected grade levels and
	report trend data on these measures over time
	annually;
(5)	Invoke a full and balanced set of appropriate
	consequences for observed performance, including
	rewards and recognition for those schools that meet or
	exceed their goals, assistance to those that fall
	short, and sanctions for those that, given adequate
	assistance and ample time, continue to fail to meet
	goals;
(6)	Involve an annual statewide assessment program that

provides a report card containing trend data on

school, school complex, and system performance at 1 selected benchmark grade levels with performance 2 3 indicators in areas relating to student achievement, safety and well-being, and civic responsibility. 4 These performance indicators shall include [but not be 5 6 limited to]: Student performance relative to statewide content 7 (A) and performance standards; and 8 School attendance and dropout rates; 9 (B) Require that teachers and administrators engage in the 10 (7)continuous professional growth and development that 11 12 ensure their currency with respect to disciplinary content, leadership skill, knowledge, or pedagogical 13 14 skill, as appropriate to their position. This requirement may be established by the department in 15 terms of credit hours earned or their equivalent in 16 professional development activity certified by the 17 department as appropriate in focus and rigor; 18 (8) Establish an explicit link between professional 19 20 evaluation results and individual accountability 21 through professional development of the knowledge, skill, and professional behavior necessary to the 22

12		(D) Any significant changes to the budget, with an				
13		explanation for the change;				
14	(10)	Include an evaluation of the effectiveness of complex				
15		area superintendents and principals in supporting:				
16		(A) Students' academic achievement, safety and well-				
17		being, and civic responsibility; and				
18		(B) The satisfaction of stakeholders affected by the				
19		work of the complex area superintendents and				
20		principals, which may be measured by broadbased				
21		surveys; and

3	SECTION 3. Section 302A-1103, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
4	amended to read as follows:				
5	"§302A-1103 Principal; authority and responsibility. The				
6	role of the principal shall include [but not be limited to]				
7	overseeing the day-to-day management of the school, the primary				
8	function of which is to develop and deliver instructional				
9	services to students in accordance with statewide educational				
10	policy and to enable students to meet or exceed statewide				
11	academic standards. The principal shall:				
12	(1) Ensure that the curriculum facilitates the achievement				
13	of the statewide student performance standards adopted				
14	for the public school system;				
15	(2) Develop and present to the school community council				
16	for its review and approval, academic and financial				
17	plans relating to the school;				
18	(3) Exercise authority over the implementation of the				
19	budget, policies, and operations of the school; [and]				
20	(4) Develop and present to the school community council,				
21	in accordance with section 302A-1308, the school

18	SECTION 4. Section 302A-1124, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
19	amended by amending subsection (g) to read as follows:			
20	"(g) The principal shall have the authority to set aside			
21	any decision made by the school community council if the			
22	principal	dete	ermines it to be in the best interests of the

school; provided that the principal notifies the school 1 2 community council. If the school community council opposes a 3 decision of the principal, an appeal shall first be brought to 4 the complex area superintendent for resolution and, if necessary, to the superintendent and, finally, to the board $\left[\frac{\partial f}{\partial t} \right]$ 5 6 education]. The board shall develop an appeals process to 7 implement the provisions of this subsection." 8 SECTION 5. Section 302A-1308, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended to read as follows: "§302A-1308 Use of resources by schools. School 10 principals shall exercise various means available, including 11 12 electronic media and websites, to engage and consult with 13 teachers, parents, and students to solicit [their] input and 14 advice on the use of [moneys and positions.] money, positions, 15 and other resources available to the school. Prior to expending moneys and implementing position assignments, principals shall 16 17 submit plans for the use of the moneys and positions to their 18 complex area superintendents who shall review the plans for 19 conformance with departmental policies and rules. Upon approval 20 of the plans, moneys may be expended by the principals for supplies, textbooks, equipment, and services. Positions may be 21 22 used to meet the unique needs of the schools."

Requires fiscal accountability measures at the school level. Requires the Board of Education to develop an appeals process for school community councils. Effective July 1, 2020. (HB985 HD2)
