HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII PAROLING AUTHORITY TO ESTABLISH A HOPE PAROLE PILOT PROGRAM.

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS, by the end of 2006, there were approximately 2,400,000 prisoners in correctional facilities across the United States, and 4,200,000 on probation; and
5	WHEREAS, many probationers often fail to show up for
6	scheduled appointments with their probation officers and decline
7	to take mandatory drug tests or test positive for illegal drug
8	use; and
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10	WHEREAS, studies show that as many as half of all
11	probationers go on to break the law again; and
12 13	WHEREAS, in 2004, the Circuit Court of the First Circuit
13	launched a probation modification project, also known as
15	Hawaii's Opportunity Probation with Enforcement, or HOPE; and
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17	WHEREAS, under conventional probation systems, probationers
18	often commit numerous probation violations, such as failing to
19	appear for appointments with their probation officer or failing
20	a drug test; and
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22	WHEREAS, these violations typically go unpunished for
23	months or years, until the number of violations accumulate to
24 25	the point that the probationer faces severe consequences, including revocation of probation and being sentenced to a long
23 26	prison term; and
27	pribon corm, and
28	WHEREAS, under the HOPE program, sanctions are imposed for
29	each probation violation; and

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WHEREAS, while these sanctions may be relatively minor, 1 2 often only a few days in jail, they are imposed immediately 3 rather than months or years after the violation; and 4 5 WHEREAS, in a one-year, randomized controlled trial comparing HOPE probationers to probationers in a control group, 6 HOPE probationers were fifty-five per cent less likely to be 7 8 arrested for a new crime, seventy-two per cent less likely to use drugs, sixty-one per cent less likely to skip appointments 9 with their supervisory officer, and fifty-three per cent less 10 likely to have their probation revoked; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, as a result of their improved progress, the HOPE probationers involved in the controlled trial served or were 14 15 sentenced to, on average, forty-eight per cent fewer days of incarceration than probationers in the control group; now, 16 17 therefore, 18 19 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 20 21 of 2010, the Senate concurring, that the Hawaii Paroling Authority is requested to establish a two-year pilot project 22 23 similar to the Judiciary's probation modification project, Hawaii's Opportunity Probation with Enforcement, or HOPE; and 24 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests that 27 the two-year pilot parole modification project consist of no 28 more than thirty parolees who are considered to be at high risk of violating the conditions of their parole; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests that 31 32 the parole modification program: 33 Provide formal warning to the parolees, in a hearing 34 (1)before the Hawaii Paroling Authority, that violation 35 of the conditions of parole shall have consequences; 36 37 (2)Require the parolees to submit to weekly randomized 38 39 drug testing; 40 41 (3) Order the arrest of parolees who test positive for illegal drug use; 42 43

Order the arrest of parolees who miss a scheduled 1 (4) 2 appointment with their parole officer, fail to appear for a required drug test, or otherwise violate the 3 4 conditions of their parole; 5 6 (5) Impose sanctions on parolees who violate the 7 conditions of their parole; and 8 9 (6) Ensure that parolees in need of drug treatment, mental 10 health therapy, or other social services shall receive the needed treatment; and 11 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests that: 14 Parolees involved in the parole modification program 15 (1)be made aware of the sanctions that will be imposed 16 for violating the conditions of their parole; 17 18 19 (2) Sanctions be imposed within a short period of time from the occurrence of the violation; and 20 21 Sanctions include the modification of the terms of (3) 22 parole to include short terms of incarceration, which 23 may be increased if a parolee continues to violate the 24 conditions of parole; and 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Paroling Authority 27 28 is requested to submit a preliminary report to the Legislature, 29 not later than December 1, 2011, and a final report not later than December 1, 2012, on: 30 31 -32 (1)The progress of the pilot project; 33 (2) Cost analysis and an accounting of expenses; 34 35 Relevant data on program participants; (3) 36 37 Program and management evaluations; and 38 (4) 39 Any other pertinent information, recommendations, or 40 (5) proposed legislation, if any, to determine whether the 41 program should be continued; and 42 43
