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HOUSE CONCURRENT

STRONGLY URGING THE INCLUSION OF PROTECTIONS FOR WOMEN'S HEALTH CARE, INCLUDING WOMEN'S REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH SERVICES, IN THE PATIENT PROTECTION AND AFFORDABLE CARE ACT.

WHEREAS, the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act is 1 2 now currently being debated in the United States Congress under the rubric of comprehensive national health care reform; and 3 4 WHEREAS, everyone in this country shares the need for 5 affordable, accessible, and comprehensive health care, but women 6 have unique roles as patients, family health care decision 7 8 makers, and caregivers -- whether paid or unpaid; and 9 WHEREAS, yet our current health care system fails to meet 10 11 the needs of far too many women, especially low-income women and minority populations; and 12 13 WHEREAS, women need health care reform with premiums and 14 15 out-of-pocket costs that are affordable and with no annual and 16 lifetime benefit caps; and 17 18 WHEREAS, women need an end to harmful insurance industry 19 practices such as gender rating or being rejected for coverage 20 based on health status or pre-existing conditions; and 21 22 WHEREAS, women are less likely to get health insurance through their jobs and more than twice as likely as men to get 23 24 employer-sponsored coverage through their spouses. And as the economy worsens, many employers are reducing health care 25 coverage for dependents, leaving millions of women and children 26 at risk; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, research has found that: 30



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1 2 3	(1)	One in four women are unable to pay their medical bills;
4 5 6	(2)	Women are more likely than men to delay or go without needed health care because of high medical costs;
7 8 9 10 11	(3)	Women who have to buy insurance directly from insurers are often charged more than men for the exact same coverage, a practice known as gender rating, which is capricious and unfair;
12 13 14 15	(4)	It is still legal in eight states and the District of Columbia for insurers to reject women for coverage if they are survivors of domestic violence;
16 17 18	(5)	Insurers can reject women simply for having had a Cesarean section;
19 20 21 22 23	(6)	Of the three thousand five hundred insurance plans reviewed by the National Women's Law Center, only twelve per cent offered comprehensive maternity coverage; and
24 25 26	(7)	Fully eighteen per cent of all women have no health insurance whatsoever; and
27 28 29 30 31	WHEREAS, women need comprehensive benefits, including reproductive health care. No woman should lose coverage that she has now, including coverage for termination of pregnancy; and	
32 33 34 35 36 37 38 39	WHEREAS, the version of the health care reform bill in the United States House of Representatives would provide the most sweeping expansion of federal prohibitions on abortion since 1976, when the Hyde Amendment was enacted that has since banned federal funds for abortion in the military, the Foreign Service, the Peace Corps, Medicaid, and other federally connected health care services; and	
40 41 42 43	Stupack (1	EAS, an amendment proposed by Representative Bart D-Michigan) essentially would expand the Hyde Amendment alth care reform bill; and



WHEREAS, the Stupak amendment would take away the freedom 1 of conscience from American women and prohibits them from 2 3 abortion coverage even if they pay for it with their own money by blocking abortion coverage from nearly all the health care 4 5 plans made possible by health care reform; and 6 WHEREAS, if incorporated into the final version of the 7 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, the Stupak Amendment 8 would: 9 10 (1) Prevent women receiving tax subsidies from using their 11 own money to purchase private insurance that covers 12 13 abortion; 14 Prevent women participating in the public health 15 (2) insurance exchange, administered by private insurance 16 companies, from using one hundred per cent of their 17 18 own money to purchase private insurance that covers 19 abortion; and 20 21 (3) Prevent low-income women from accessing abortion entirely, in many cases; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, it is crucial that women's health care needs be recognized and that the Patient Protection and Affordable Care 25 26 Act include protections for women's health care, including women's reproductive health services; now, therefore, 27 28 29 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 30 31 of 2010, the Senate concurring, that the United States Congress 32 is strongly urged to include protections for women's health care, including women's reproductive health services in the 33 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of Hawaii's 36 congressional delegation are urged to support the inclusion of 37 protections for women's health care, including women's 38 reproductive health services in the Patient Protection and 39 40 Affordable Care Act; and 41 42 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the President of the 43 United States, the President of the United States Senate, the 44 HCR LRB 10-0585-1
