## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ADOPT A POLICY FOR THE INTEGRATION OF A PEDAGOGY OF ALOHA IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS FOR IMPROVED LEARNING IN THE 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY.

WHEREAS, on September 13, 2007, the United Nations General
 Assembly adopted the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of
 Indigenous Peoples (Declaration), thereby establishing a
 comprehensive framework for the promotion and protection of
 indigenous peoples around the globe; and

7 WHEREAS, Article 15 of the Declaration states that 8 "indigenous peoples have the right to the dignity and diversity 9 of their cultures, traditions, histories and aspirations which shall be appropriately reflected in education and public 10 information" and that "States shall take effective measures, in 11 12 consultation and cooperation with the indigenous peoples concerned, to combat prejudice and eliminate discrimination and 13 to promote tolerance, understanding and good relations among 14 indigenous peoples and all other segments of society"; and 15 16

WHEREAS, on April 23, 2009, Senate Resolution No. 147 was 17 passed, urging the President of the United States and United 18 States Congress to adopt the Declaration, and cited the need to 19 20 "preserve and maintain the Hawaiian culture, to protect and promote the human rights of the kanaka maoli, the indigenous 21 people of Hawaii, and to support the efforts of the kanaka maoli 22 23 to pursue environmentally sustainable economic, social, and educational activities to ensure the survival of their culture"; 24 and 25

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WHEREAS, pursuant to Article X, Section 4 of the Hawaii
Constitution, the State is responsible for providing for "a
Hawaiian education program consisting of language, culture, and
history in the public schools"; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (BOE) is charged with 1 integrating Hawaiian language, culture, and history into the 2 State's public school system; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, pursuant to Act 51, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004, the goal of which was to reform education in Hawaii, "education 6 7 must do no less than advance the endowment of human culture itself, so that each succeeding generation finds itself further 8 9 along the road towards peace, social justice, and environmental 10 sustainability in a society guided by creativity, compassion, and curiosity"; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the development of educational philosophies and 13 practices that embody indigenous pedagogical perspectives is 14 fundamental to empowering children to be effective, contributing 15 members of a globalized and culturally-diverse world; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, the inclusion of native Hawaiian cultural 19 perspectives in the State's public school system is critical to providing Hawaii's indigenous and non-indigenous students with a 20 21 dynamic and culturally-based education that fosters tolerance, 22 understanding, and mutual respect between people; and 23 WHEREAS, despite attempts by the Legislature to reform 24 education in Hawaii, the public school system continues to 25 26 follow mainstream, Western pedagogical paradigms at the expense of including indigenous strategies of knowledge construction and 27 dissemination; and 28 29 30 WHEREAS, a lack of safety, security, and practice of Hawaiian values in Hawaii's public schools correlates directly 31 32 with the high dropout rates observed in schools around the 33 state; and 34 35 WHEREAS, schools that practice Hawaiian cultural values, such as aloha -- the Hawaiian cultural principle of aloha that 36 37 entails the love of self, family, and the wider community -- are less likely to encounter high incidences of assault, prejudice, 38 39 sexual abuse, and harassment; and

WHEREAS, the evolution of a pedagogy that is commensurate 1 2 with the cultural, social, and economic realities of Hawaii is critical to the future of education in this state; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, a pedagogy of aloha is grounded in the wisdom and 6 values of a native Hawaiian worldview and strives to create an 7 atmosphere of mutual trust, respect, and inclusiveness among 8 teachers, students, and students' families; and 9 10 WHEREAS, a pedagogy of aloha provides students with an effective learning environment in which they feel nurtured, 11 12 safe, and encouraged to achieve the highest level of success in everything they do; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, Nā Lei Na'auao (the Native Hawaiian Charter School Alliance), which is made up of 12 Hawaiian-focused public 16 charter schools serving over 4,000 students from kindergarten to 17 grade 12 on three islands, has successfully integrated a 18 19 pedagogy of aloha for the past decade; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the implementation of a pedagogy of aloha by Nā Lei Na'auao schools has resulted in increased student attendance 22 and graduation rates, and reduced dropout rates, which is in 23 24 stark contrast to other Department of Education schools; and 25 26 WHEREAS, the entire education system in Hawaii will benefit 27 from the formation of an integrated pedagogy in which indigenous 28 knowledge interfaces with conventional educational practices; 29 now, therefore, 30 31 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 32 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 33 of 2010, that BOE is requested to adopt a policy for the 34 integration of a pedagoqy of aloha in public schools for improved learning in the 21<sup>st</sup> century; and 35 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body calls on BOE to 38 observe the "Decade of Aloha" by implementing appropriate 39 programs and activities that promote awareness of native Hawaiian culture and encourage the practice of a pedagogy of 40 aloha in public schools statewide; and 41



BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Chairperson of the Board of Education, Superintendent of Education, Executive Director of the Charter School Administrative Office, President of the University of Hawaii, and the Mayor of each county.
