HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY TO REQUIRE IN ITS CONTRACTS THAT INCARCERATED MEN AND WOMEN BE FREE TO PRACTICE MORE THAN ONE RELIGION.

WHEREAS, freedom to practice religion is guaranteed under 1 2 Article I, Section 4 of the Hawaii Constitution, which states, "No law shall be enacted respecting an establishment of 3 religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging 4 the freedom of speech or of the press or the right of the people 5 peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a 6 7 redress of grievances"; and 8 9 WHEREAS, after western contact, many Hawaiian ali'i converted to Christianity, while also practicing their Hawaiian 10 11 religion and engaging in Hawaiian cultural and spiritual 12 practices; and 13 14 WHEREAS, today, many Native Hawaiians continue to practice two religions--their Hawaiian religion as well as another 15 religion, such as Christianity or Buddhism; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiians who have been incarcerated in out-of-state facilities have been forced to choose one religion 19 that they are allowed to practice; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, inmates of other ethnic and ancestral backgrounds 23 face a similar situation and must also choose between faiths; 24 and 25 WHEREAS, the federal Religious Land Use and 26 27 Institutionalized Persons Act, Title 42 United States Code Chapter 21C, prohibits the imposition of burdens on the ability 28 of prisoners to worship; and 29 30 31 WHEREAS, Title 42 United States Code Section 2000cc-1 states that "No government shall impose a substantial burden on 32 the religious exercise of a person residing in or confined to an 33 34 institution . . . unless the government demonstrates that HR104 HD1 HMS 2010-2827
