HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL TO ADOPT UNAMBIGUOUS LANGUAGE REGARDING PHOTOGRAPHIC RECORDS ON EXPUNGEMENT CERTIFICATES.

1 WHEREAS, Black's Law Dictionary defines "expungement of 2 record" as a "process by which record of criminal conviction is 3 destroyed or sealed after expiration of time" and elaborates by 4 stating that "some states also provide for expungement of 5 criminal records if arrested person is not convicted or in the 6 event of unlawful arrest"; and

8 WHEREAS, each state may set its own guidelines regarding 9 which records may be expunded and under which circumstances, 10 including whether arrest record expundements may be granted at 11 all; and

WHEREAS, in general practice, once arrest records have been expunged, an individual may respond to any question or inquiry that he or she has no arrest record with respect to the specific records and incidents that have been expunged; and

18 WHEREAS, several states allow for the expungement of arrest
 19 records with convictions, including Arizona, California,
 20 Illinois, and New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, in Hawaii, the expungement process is codified in section 831-3.2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and allows expungement of arrest records only in cases where there was no conviction; and

WHEREAS, as part of an application for an expungement
order, an individual may request the return of fingerprints and
photographs; and

31 WHEREAS, once an expungement order is granted, an 32 individual receives an Expungement Certificate that certifies 33 the specific records of arrest that have been annulled; and

WHEREAS, the Expungement Certificate also contains language 1 2 that states that if digitized images were taken, those images 3 cannot be returned to the individual since they have been deleted; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, due to the rapid development and proliferation of digital photographic equipment, it appears unlikely that law 7 8 enforcement continues to use traditional film formats for 9 procedures associated with arrests; and 10 11 WHEREAS, clarifying the language used on Expungement Certificates regarding photographic records would help eliminate 12 13 any ambiguity with respect to those documents that have not been 14 returned to the individual; now, therefore, 15 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 17 18 of 2010, that this body requests the Attorney General to adopt 19 unambiguous language regarding photographic records on 20 Expungement Certificates; and 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that such language should clearly 22 23 reflect current practices surrounding photographic records, including the almost certain use of digitized images; and 24 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 27 Resolution be transmitted to the Attorney General, Administrator of the Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center, and the Police Chief 28 29 of each county. 30 31 32 OFFERED BY:
