HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII PAROLING AUTHORITY TO ESTABLISH A HOPE PAROLE PILOT PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, by the end of 2006, there were approximately 1 2 2,400,000 prisoners in correctional facilities across the United 3 States, and 4,200,000 on probation; and 4 WHEREAS, many probationers often fail to show up for 5 scheduled appointments with their probation officers and decline 6 to take mandatory drug tests or test positive for illegal drug 7 8 use; and 9 WHEREAS, studies show that as many as half of all 10 probationers go on to break the law again; and 11 12 WHEREAS, in 2004, the Circuit Court of the First Circuit 13 launched a probation modification project, also known as 14 Hawaii's Opportunity Probation with Enforcement, or HOPE; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, under conventional probation systems, probationers often commit numerous probation violations, such as failing to 18 appear for appointments with their probation officer or failing 19 20 a drug test; and 21 22 WHEREAS, these violations typically go unpunished for months or years, until the number of violations accumulate to 23 the point that the probationer faces severe consequences, 24 including revocation of probation and being sentenced to a long 25 prison term; and 26 27 WHEREAS, under the HOPE program, sanctions are imposed for 28 each probation violation; and 29 30 31 WHEREAS, while these sanctions may be relatively minor, 32 often only a few days in jail, they are imposed immediately rather than months or years after the violation; and 33 34



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WHEREAS, in a one-year, randomized controlled trial 1 2 comparing HOPE probationers to probationers in a control group, HOPE probationers were fifty-five per cent less likely to be 3 arrested for a new crime, seventy-two per cent less likely to 4 5 use drugs, sixty-one per cent less likely to skip appointments with their supervisory officer, and fifty-three per cent less 6 7 likely to have their probation revoked; and 8 9 WHEREAS, as a result of their improved progress, the HOPE probationers involved in the controlled trial served or were 10 11 sentenced to, on average, forty-eight per cent fewer days of incarceration than probationers in the control group; now, 12 13 therefore, 14 15 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 16 of 2010, that the Hawaii Paroling Authority is requested to 17 18 establish a two-year pilot project similar to the Judiciary's probation modification project, Hawaii's Opportunity Probation 19 with Enforcement, or HOPE; and 20 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests that the two-year pilot parole modification project consist of no 23 24 more than thirty parolees who are considered to be at high risk 25 of violating the conditions of their parole; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests that the parole modification program: 28 29 Provide formal warning to the parolees, in a hearing 30 (1)before the Hawaii Paroling Authority, that violation 31 32 of the conditions of parole shall have consequences; 33 (2)Require the parolees to submit to weekly randomized 34 drug testing; 35 36 37 (3) Order the arrest of parolees who test positive for illegal drug use; 38 39 (4)Order the arrest of parolees who miss a scheduled 40 appointment with their parole officer, fail to appear 41 for a required drug test, or otherwise violate the 42 43 conditions of their parole; 44



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1 2 3	(5)	Impose sanctions on parolees who violate the conditions of their parole; and
4 5 6 7	(6)	Ensure that parolees in need of drug treatment, mental health therapy, or other social services shall receive the needed treatment; and
8 9	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests that:	
10 11 12 13	(1)	Parolees involved in the parole modification program be made aware of the sanctions that will be imposed for violating the conditions of their parole;
14 15 16	° (2)	Sanctions be imposed within a short period of time from the occurrence of the violation; and
10 17 18 19 20 21	(3)	Sanctions include the modification of the terms of parole to include short terms of incarceration, which may be increased if a parolee continues to violate the conditions of parole; and
21 22 23 24 25 26	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Paroling Authority is requested to submit a preliminary report to the Legislature, not later than December 1, 2011, and a final report not later than December 1, 2012, on:	
20 27 28	(1)	The progress of the pilot project;
20 29 30	(2)	Cost analysis and an accounting of expenses;
31 32	(3)	Relevant data on program participants;
33 34	(4)	Program and management evaluations; and
35 36 37 38	• (5)	Any other pertinent information, recommendations, or proposed legislation, if any, to determine whether the program should be continued; and
