HOUSE RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING THE RECOGNITION OF COCKFIGHTING AS A CULTURAL ACTIVITY.

WHEREAS, cockfighting has a long and cherished tradition in 1 many cultures throughout the world, from Europe to the Americas 2 3 to Asia, and has even been part of American culture since colonial times; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, two founding fathers of our country -- George Washington and Thomas Jefferson -- recognized the value of 7 cockfighting as participants in the activity, and Abraham 8 Lincoln was nicknamed "Honest Abe" not for his politics, but 9 10 because of his honesty as a cockfight referee; and 11 WHEREAS, cockfighting is a proud Hispanic tradition -- one 12 many are unwilling to give up -- and a legal activity in Mexico; 13 14 and 15 WHEREAS, according to those involved in the activity, 16 roosters are neither brutalized nor forced to fight, as fights 17 occur as a natural part of the process of establishing a pecking 18 19 order among the birds; and 20 WHEREAS, although an important part of the activity, the 21 22 fighting plays only a minor role: it takes two years to raise a fighting cock, and caring for game fowl is a day-in and day-out 23 24 responsibility; and 25 WHEREAS, unlike the millions of factory-farm chickens that 26 are raised in cramped and crowded pens before being slaughtered 27 for human consumption, gamecocks are raised in fresh air and 28 29 sunshine and are given plenty of room to move around; and 30 31 WHEREAS, gamecock breeders in the United States spend millions of dollars annually on chicken feed and related 32 33 supplies, pay to ship birds to other breeders or places where 34 cockfighting is legal, and pay for travel to cockfighting



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tournaments, making a considerable contribution to the economy; 1 2 and 3 4 WHEREAS, according to a spokesperson for the Hawaii game 5 fowl industry, Hawaii game fowl breeders legally pump an estimated \$9,000,000 into the local economy each year, which is 6 7 subject to general excise taxes; and 8 9 WHEREAS, successful breeders maintain studbooks that trace the lineage of their birds over many generations, and the 10 primary purpose of fighting them is to prove the breeder's 11 success in elevating bloodline quality; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, those who stigmatize cockfighting may not 15 understand these anthropological and other aspects of the 16 activity, or its cultural significance; now, therefore, 17 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 18 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 19 of 2010, that this body supports the recognition of cockfighting 20 21 as a cultural activity; and 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 23 24 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and Mayor of each 25 county. 26 27 28 Analon OFFERED BY:

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
