HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO PERFORM A SUNRISE ANALYSIS OF THE REGULATION OF THE PROFESSION OF MUSIC THERAPY.

1 WHEREAS, the American Music Therapy Association (AMTA) 2 defines music therapy as the clinical and evidence-based use of 3 music interventions to accomplish individualized goals within a 4 therapeutic relationship by a credentialed professional who has 5 completed an approved music therapy program; and

WHEREAS, research supports music therapy's effectiveness in
areas such as physical rehabilitation, pain management, speech
and communication development, social skills, cognitive
processing and attention to task, behavioral needs, academic
goals, treatment motivation, emotional support, and creative
expression; and

WHEREAS, music therapy has 60 years of clinical history in the United States (U.S.) and receives national recognition from the federal Department of Aging and General Services Administration, and the state Department of Health (DOH), Department of Human Services, and Department of Education (DOE); and

WHEREAS, professional music therapists hold a bachelor's
 degree or higher level of study in music therapy from accredited
 colleges or universities; and

WHEREAS, music therapists obtain the national credential
"MT-BC" (Music Therapist-Board Certified) from the Certification
Board for Music Therapists (CBMT), an independent, nonprofit
corporation fully accredited by the National Commission for
Certifying Agencies, upon successful completion of:

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- (1) An AMTA-approved academic and clinical training program; and

NO. 107 A written objective national examination; (2) and WHEREAS, after the assessment of the strengths and needs of each client, qualified board certified music therapists provide indicated treatment and participate as members of the interdisciplinary team to support a vast continuum of outcomes; and WHEREAS, the consumer of music therapy services includes children and adults with medical illnesses, psychiatric disorders, developmental disabilities, speech and hearing impairments, physical disabilities, and neurological impairments, among others; and WHEREAS, music therapy is considered a related service under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) when deemed necessary to assist a child in benefiting from the child's special education; and WHEREAS, the profession of music therapy is separate and distinct from the profession of music education, as music therapists use music to address many of the goals targeted in the Individualized Education Program (IEP) such as the: (1)Learning of academic concepts; (2)Increasing cooperation and appropriate social behavior; Providing avenues for communication; (3) (4) Increasing self-esteem and self confidence; (5) Improving motor responses and agility; and (6) Encouraging exploration and examination of issues that

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services, within a variety of healthcare and education settings 1 but do not specifically include music therapy provided by a 2 board certified music therapist; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the children of Hawaii are currently denied access 5 6 to music therapy services as a part of their Individualized 7 Family Service Plan, IEP, or Individualized Service Plan; and 8 9 WHEREAS, without enabling state laws, music therapy is not being included in mandated services, thereby denying Hawaii 10 residents access to this health service that is recognized by 11 the National Institutes Of Health; and 12 13 WHEREAS, members of the public have no avenue for recourse 14 or investigation in the event an individual falsely claims to 15 provide music therapy services and this lack of state 16 credentialing of the existing national professional standards 17 and board certification, limits public protection and oversight 18 of this unregulated profession; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs 21 (DCCA) oversees the regulation of licensed professional service 22 providers; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, the establishment of a licensing program for unregulated professional board certified music therapists in 26 Hawaii under DCCA will provide necessary and proper oversight; 27 28 and 29 WHEREAS, under section 26H-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes 30 (HRS), a sunrise analysis by the Auditor must occur prior to 31 initiating regulation of a profession; now, therefore, 32 33 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 34 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 35 36 of 2010, that the Auditor is requested to perform an analysis of the proposed regulation of the profession of music therapy, as 37 proposed in House Bill No. 2010; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor consult with AMTA; 40 the Certification Board for Music Therapists; representatives of 41 the credentialed music therapists in Hawaii; and Sounding Joy 42 Music Therapy, Inc., a certified music therapy organization in 43 Honolulu, in developing the sunrise analysis; and 44 3



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to set forth the probable effects of the proposed regulation and to assess whether the proposed regulation is consistent with the policies set forth in section 26H-2, HRS, and whether there are alternative forms of regulation; and

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 8 transmit its findings of the sunrise analysis to the Legislature 9 no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the Regular 10 Session of 2011; and

12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 13 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Director of Commerce 14 and Consumer Affairs, Auditor, Director of Health, 15 Superintendent of Education, Director of Government Relations 16 for the American Music Therapy Association, and the Regulatory 17 Affairs Advisor for the Certification Board for Music 18 Therapists.
