HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE BOARD OF NATUROPATHIC MEDICINE TO PERMIT NATUROPATHIC PHYSICIANS LICENSED PRIOR TO JANUARY 1, 2010, TO PERFORM PARENTERAL THERAPEUTICS.

WHEREAS, the State recognizes that naturopathic medicine 1 includes all natural medicines, natural procedures, and natural 2 3 therapeutics; and 4 5 WHEREAS, all persons recognize that a snake naturally bites to inject venom; therefore, snake bites are a natural 6 7 procedure of injection; and 8 9 WHEREAS, all persons also recognize that bee stings, mosquito bites, leaches, stinging nettles, and vana (Hawaiian 10 11 sea urchins) are all examples of injection as a natural procedure; and 12 13 WHEREAS, all accredited professional schools of 14 naturopathic medicine educate, train, and qualify students to 15 perform parenteral therapeutics including intramuscular, 16 subcutaneous, and intravenous injection techniques and skills; 17 and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, the licensing examinations accepted by the State of Hawaii have included and covered parenteral therapeutics; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, licensing laws exist to insure a minimal level of competency; and 24 25 WHEREAS, all past and present naturopathic physicians 26 licensed by the Board of Naturopathic Medicine have performed 27 and provided parenteral therapeutics and injections, as did all 28 29 licensed naturopathic physicians under the prior licensing laws; 30 and 31



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1 WHEREAS, in addition to education, training, and examination, error-free and complaint-free performance 2 3 demonstrates professional competency among naturopathic 4 physicians; and 5 WHEREAS, principles and practices of medicine, naturopathic 6 7 medicine, and pharmacology often require the use of parenteral therapeutics for the health and wellness of patients, parenteral 8 9 administration of medicines may often be a safer, more 10 effective, and more congenial method of administration; and 11 WHEREAS, Act 22, Session Laws of Hawaii (2009) amended 12 chapter 455, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to specify that parenteral 13 14 therapy is not allowed under the practice of naturopathic 15 medicine until the Board of Naturopathic Medicine adopts rules relating to this practice; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the Board of Naturopathic Medicine's naturopathic 18 19 formulary, effective January 1, 2010, specifically prohibits the injection of formulary items; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, the Board of Naturopathic Medicine has failed in its primary responsibility of protecting and promoting public 23 health by prohibiting licensed naturopathic physicians from 24 25 performing parenteral therapeutics, thereby interrupting the ongoing health care of patients in Hawaii; creating a health 26 care crisis for patients and their naturopathic physician 27 providers; and risking the health, wellness, and lives of 28 29 patients in need of parenteral therapeutics; and 30 WHEREAS, this failure violates Article IX of the 31 Constitution of the State of Hawaii; now, therefore, 32 33 34 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 35 36 of 2010, that injection is a natural procedure; and 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Naturopathic 38 Medicine is urged to adopt rules that grandfather all persons 39 licensed under chapter 455, Hawaii Revised Statutes, prior to 40 January 1, 2010, with regard to allowing those persons to 41



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perform intramuscular, subcutaneous, and intravenous injection 1 and prescribe, administer, and dispense naturopathic formulary 2 substances manufactured for injection; and 3 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Attorney General, the Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, and the Chairperson 6 7 of the Board of Naturopathic Medicine are urged to immediately: 8 Remove the restrictive language in the naturopathic 9 (1)formulary prohibiting the prescription, 10 administration, and dispensing of items in injectable 11 form or by injection; 12 13 14 (2)Amend the naturopathic formulary to include the prescription, administration, and dispensation of 15 items within the naturopathic formulary; and 16 17 (3) Publish the naturopathic formulary to reflect the 18 necessary changes that will permit naturopathic 19 physicians licensed prior to January 1, 2010, to 20 administer parenteral therapeutics; and 21 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 24 Resolution be transmitted to the Attorney General, the Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, and the members of the Board 25 of Naturopathic Medicine. 26 27 28 29 OFFERED BY:

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
