HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO ADDRESS THE ISSUE OF DETERMINING THE CAUSES OF ELDERLY ABUSE, DETERMINING BEST PRACTICES, AND ESTABLISHING A SENIOR LEGAL HELP LINE.

WHEREAS, the United States Senate Special Committee on 1 2 Aging has estimated that up to 5,000,000 adults each year are victims of neglect, exploitation, or other abuse; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, other studies indicate that up to six per cent of the national population of older adults has experienced some 6 7 type of abuse, neglect, or exploitation; and 8 WHEREAS, adult protective services are mandated for adult 9 victims of abuse in each of the 50 states and the District of 10 Columbia; and 11 12 WHEREAS, results of a recent Elder Abuse Incidence Study 13 shed light on a significant problem of elder abuse and neglect 14 among elders living in their own homes who have gone largely 15 unidentified and unnoticed; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the study noted that only one in five new 18 19 incidents of abuse, neglect, or self-neglect are reported to adult protective services agencies; and 20 21 WHEREAS, here in Hawaii, adult protective services provide 22 crisis intervention, investigation, and emergency services to 23 dependent adults who are reported to be abused, neglected, or 24 financially exploited by others or seriously endangered due to 25 self-neglect; and 26 27 WHEREAS, there are just over 84,000 elders who are 75 years 28 or older in Hawaii; and 29 30

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1 WHEREAS, national estimates of the frequency of abuse 2 towards this population range from five to ten per cent, which suggests that there may be 4,000 or more cases of abuse in 3 4 Hawaii each year; and 5 WHEREAS, however, the Department of Human Services 6 indicates that in 2006, it investigated 514 cases, which 7 suggests a large gap between those receiving services and those 8 possibly experiencing abuse; and 9 10 WHEREAS, according to the University of Hawaii Center on 11 12 the Family, between 2000 and 2030, the number of adults in Hawaii who will be 60 years and older will increase by 93.8 per 13 cent and those 85 years and older will increase by 174 per cent; 14 15 this, in turn, will result in a small proportion of children and 16 younger adults in relation to those 60 years and older; and 17 18 WHEREAS, there has also been concern regarding whether any 19 changes to the current Adult Protective Services Law would 20 result in an increased case load and consequential strain on 21 case workers; and 22 23 WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services, Adult Protection 24 Services is only available during regular business hours, which has been reduced by furloughs, and does not provide any legal 25 assistance or provide assistance unless the person consents to a 26 27 social worker's evaluation; and 28 29 WHEREAS, California has created a Senior Legal Hotline to 30 provide seniors with fast, accurate advice on any legal subject, 31 by phone and Internet; and 32 33 WHEREAS, the California Senior Legal Hotline is funded 34 primarily through a federal grant, which mandates statewide 35 coverage, however more funding would be needed to provide this coverage; now, therefore, 36 37 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 38 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 39 40 of 2010, that the Executive Office on Aging is requested to 41 convene a task force for the purpose of determining the causes

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of increased elder abuse in Hawaii, the needs of elders, law enforcement, and the community at large to determine the best practices in preventative measures, and investigate the development of a statewide Senior Legal Helpline established with Federal Grants and non-profit organization funding; and

- 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be chaired by 8 the Executive Director for the Executive Office on Aging and 9 consist of the following members:
- 11 (1) The Director of the Department of Human Services; 12 13 (2) The police chiefs of each county, or their designees; 14 15 (3) The Executive Director of Legal Aid Society of Hawaii; 16 17 (4) One member of the Senate, to be appointed by the
 - (5) One member of the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of
 - Representatives; and

Senate President;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the task force submit their recommendations to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2011 Regular Session; and

28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 29 Resolution be transmitted to the Executive Director of the 30 Executive Office on Aging, the director of Human Services, the 31 police chiefs of each county, the Executive Director of Legal 32 Aid Society of Hawaii.

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
