## HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO PROVIDE ACADEMIC CREDIT OR SOME OTHER INCENTIVE OR PENALTY TO MOTIVATE STUDENTS TO TAKE THE ADEQUATE YEARLY PROGRESS TESTS SERIOUSLY.

WHEREAS, the Department of Education administers the 1 2 Adequate Yearly Progress tests for public school students 3 pursuant to the federal No Child Left Behind program; and 4 5 WHEREAS, under the No Child Left Behind program, each state is required to define "adequate yearly progress" for its 6 students and to determine and quantify the progress that will be 7 made in student achievement annually until 2014, when all 8 9 students must reach a definable level of academic proficiency; 10 and 11 WHEREAS, if a school fails to achieve academic proficiency, 12 13 the school is then subject to technical assistance but must allow students to transfer to another school if the student so 14 15 chooses; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the longer a school fails to reach proficiency, sanctions against the school become progressively more severe 18 until the school is taken-over by the State; and 19 20 WHEREAS, it is imperative that students take the Adequate 21 22 Yearly Progress tests seriously to prevent the imposition of sanctions that could disrupt the administration of public 23 schools; and 24 25 WHEREAS, anecdotal information from students and teachers 26 suggests that students do not appear to be taking the Adequate 27 28 Yearly Progress tests seriously; and 29 WHEREAS, reports of students misusing their answer bubbles 30 on the test by strategically connecting the bubbles to create a 31 picture or message strongly suggests that some students do not 32 appreciate the consequences of their actions; and 33 34 HR LRB 10-2015-3.doc



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WHEREAS, some students intentionally perform poorly in 1 order to reflect negatively on teachers they do not like; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, there does not appear to be any incentive for students to do well or penalty for doing poorly; and 5 6 7 WHEREAS, generally, students are of the opinion that anywhere from twenty-five to fifty per cent of the students 8 taking the test do not do so seriously; now, therefore, 9 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 11 12 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2010, that the Board of Education is urged to provide 13 academic credit or penalty to motivate students to take the 14 15 Adequate Yearly Progress tests seriously; and 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 17 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Chairperson of 18 the Board of Education, and the Superintendent of Education. 19 20 21 22 OFFERED BY:

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
