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HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING GOVERNMENT-FUNDED HOUSING AGENCIES TO AFFORD ELDERLY TENANTS IN PUBLIC AND SENIOR HOUSING WHO HAVE UNEXPECTEDLY BECOME THE PRIMARY CAREGIVERS OF THEIR GRANDCHILDREN-IN-CRISIS A REASONABLE TIME TO FIND APPROPRIATE HOUSING BEFORE THEY MAY BE EVICTED.

WHEREAS, in the process of life sometimes unforeseen 1 circumstances or family crises beyond one's control result in a 2 3 situation where grandparents become the caregivers or legal quardians of their grandchildren-in-crisis; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, Act 220, Session Laws of Hawaii 2008, established a Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Task Force to focus on the 7 needs and issues of grandparents raising grandchildren; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Task Force 10 found that grandparents caring for grandchildren experience 11 difficulties finding adequate housing; and 12 13 WHEREAS, in Hawaii, natural processes and cultural 14 15 practices are accepted, respected, and practiced when a grandparent cares for a grandchild-in-crisis, as documented in 16 The 2007 Needs Assessment of Grandparents Raising Grandchildren 17 (Assessment) prepared by the University of Hawaii at Manoa, 18 Department of Family and Consumer Science; and 19 20 21 WHEREAS, the Assessment reports that over 14,000 grandparents are primary caregivers for over 33,000 22 grandchildren in the State of Hawaii, and that these 23 grandparents are playing an important part in ensuring the 24 well-being of children in Hawaii and are also saving the State 25 26 approximately \$17,000,000 per month by caring for their grandchildren outside the foster care system; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, seniors who have limited or fixed incomes and who live in government-funded public housing or senior housing could 30 suddenly find themselves caring for grandchildren-in-crisis who 31 are minors and in need of immediate care, shelter, and food; and 32 33



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WHEREAS, Hawaii's housing market is one of the costliest in 1 the nation, providing few options for seniors living on limited 2 incomes; and 3 4 WHEREAS, a senior who lives in a public or senior housing 5 on a limited income may not be able to immediately find housing 6 to accommodate a grandchild, and may have to apply for a 7 suitable public housing unit that entails being placed on a 8 waitlist, a situation that forces the grandparent to continue to 9 live in the same unit in possible violation of housing policies 10 and rules; and 11 12 WHEREAS, current federal and state laws exempt certain 13 senior housing complexes from housing discrimination laws 14 intended to protect families with children, and accordingly, 15 grandparents may be evicted for allowing a grandchild under the 16 age of eighteen to live with them; and 17 18 WHEREAS, federal and state laws allow housing authorities 19 and managers of public housing complexes to change policy and 20 house rules to make exceptions for seniors who need to find new 21 22 housing; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Task Force strongly recommended to the Kupuna Caucus and the Joint 25 Legislative Committee on Aging in Place and Family Caregiving 26 that general awareness be raised about the plight of 27 grandparents raising grandchildren-in-crisis in senior housing, 28 particularly the need to allow grandparents more time to find 29 30 new housing; now, therefore, 31 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 32 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 33 of 2010, that all public and private housing agencies that 34 receive government funding are requested to make appropriate 35 36 exemptions in their respective policies to allow tenants who are seniors to keep grandchildren-in-crisis with them in their units 37 for a reasonable period of time until suitable housing is 38 obtained to accommodate the grandchildren; and 39 40 41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that housing officials are requested to waive house rules and avoid sending eviction notices to 42 eligible seniors who unexpectedly become the primary caregivers 43



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1 to their grandchildren-in-crisis to allow affected grandparents 2 a reasonable time period to find appropriate housing; and 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that housing officials are

5 requested, as a proactive approach to affording relief, to 6 identify affected grandparents; and 7
