A BILL FOR AN ACT

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The purpose of criminal trials in the State of 2 Hawaii ought to be to find the truth, to convict the guilty, and to free the innocent. Admission, not exclusion, of relevant 3 4 evidence furthers these goals. The Constitution and laws of the 5 United States, and statutes of the State of Hawaii duly enacted 6 by the legislature, appropriately restrict the admission of 7 relevant evidence in some circumstances. The supreme court of Hawaii, however, has broadly interpreted Hawaii's constitution 8 9 to require the exclusion of relevant evidence in criminal cases 10 in ways that impede the truth-finding function of criminal 11 This amendment prevents that type of exclusion of trials. 12 evidence, and makes clear that relevant evidence shall always be 13 admitted in criminal trials unless exclusion of that evidence is 14 pursuant to the United States Constitution or the laws of the United States or the State of Hawaii. 15

Because the rules of evidence of the State of Hawaii are 16 statutes of the State of Hawaii, this amendment will not affect 17 18 the current rules of evidence. SB LRB 09-1425.doc

1	SECTION 2. Article I of the Constitution of the State of
2	Hawaii is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"ADMISSIBILITY OF RELEVANT EVIDENCE IN CRIMINAL CASES
5	Section . Any other provision of this constitution
6	notwithstanding, relevant evidence shall never be excluded from
7	evidence in criminal cases except pursuant to the laws or
8	Constitution of the United States or a State of Hawaii statute."
9	SECTION 3. The question to be printed on the ballot shall
10	be as follows:
11	"Shall Hawaii's constitution be amended to provide that
12	relevant evidence shall never be excluded from evidence in
13	criminal cases except pursuant to the laws or Constitution
14	of the United States or a State of Hawaii statute?"
15	SECTION 4. New constitutional material is underscored.
16	SECTION 5. This amendment shall take effect upon
17	compliance with article XVII, section 3, of the Constitution of
18	the State of Hawaii.
