#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 323F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 "§323F- Criminal history record checks. (a) The Hawaii 5 health systems corporation shall develop procedures for 6 obtaining verifiable information regarding the criminal history of persons who are employed or seeking employment, or are 7 8 current or prospective contractors, providers or volunteers in 9 any of the corporation's health facilities. The procedures shall 10 include but not be limited to criminal history record checks in 11 accordance with section 846-2.7. 12 The Hawaii criminal justice data center may assess 13 providers and contractors a reasonable fee for criminal history 14 record checks performed. Providers and contractors shall be 15 responsible for payment to the Hawaii criminal justice data

center of the fee for the criminal history records checks.

1 (c) Any Hawaii health systems corporation employee, applicant for employment, or current or prospective contractor, 2 3 provider, or volunteer, who has been convicted of a criminal offense for which incarceration is a sentencing option, may be 4 5 terminated, not hired, released, or not be utilized. This 6 action will be based on the corporation's analysis of whether 7 the nature and circumstances of the crime may pose a risk to the 8 health, safety, or well-being of patients and residents in its 9 health facilities. 10 (d) For the purposes of this section: 11 "Contractor" means any organization or individual that 12 enters into a contract or agreement to provide services to the 13 patients or residents in any of the Hawaii health systems 14 corporation's health facilities. 15 "Criminal history record check" means an examination of an individual's criminal history records by means including, but 16 17 not limited to, fingerprint analysis and name inquiry into state 18 and national criminal history record files. 19 "Provider" means any organization or individual that 20 currently provides or intends to enter into a contract or 21 agreement to provide services to the patients or residents in 22 any of the Hawaii health systems corporation's health

1 facilities, or is a student in any program at any of Hawaii 2 health systems corporation's health facilities. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, for 3 (e) 4 purposes of this section, the Hawaii health systems corporation shall be exempt from section 831-3.1 and need not conduct 5 6 investigations, notifications, or hearing under this section in accordance with chapter 91." 7 SECTION 2. Section 378-2.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows: 9 10 "(d) Notwithstanding subsections (b) and (c), the 11 requirement that inquiry into and consideration of a prospective 12 employee's conviction record may take place only after the individual has received a conditional job offer, and the 13 14 limitation to the most recent ten-year period, excluding the 15 period of incarceration, shall not apply to employers who are 16 expressly permitted to inquire into an individual's criminal 17 history for employment purposes pursuant to any federal or state 18 law other than subsection (a), including: The State or any of its branches, political 19 (1)subdivisions, or agencies pursuant to sections 78-2.7 20
