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# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 323F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§323F- Criminal history record checks. (a) The Hawaii
5	health systems corporation shall develop procedures for
6	obtaining verifiable information regarding the criminal history
7	of persons who are employed or seeking employment, or are
8	current or prospective contractors, providers, or volunteers in
9	any of the corporation's health facilities. The procedures shall
10	include but not be limited to criminal history record checks in
11	accordance with section 846-2.7.
12	The Hawaii criminal justice data center may assess
13	providers and contractors a reasonable fee for criminal history
14	record checks performed. Providers and contractors shall be
15	responsible for payment to the Hawaii criminal justice data
16	center of the fee for the criminal history record checks.

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1	(b)	Except as otherwise specified, any person who is a
2	<u>current</u> o	r prospective board member; employed or who seeks
3	employmen	t with Hawaii health systems corporation; or current or
4	prospecti	ve contractor, provider, or volunteer in any of the
5	<u>corporati</u>	on's health facilities may be required to provide to the
6	corporati	on:
7	(1)	A sworn statement indicating whether the person has
8		ever been convicted of an offense for which
9		incarceration was a sentencing option, and the details
10		thereof;
11	(2)	Written consent for the corporation to obtain criminal
12	×	history record check information for verification; and
13	(3)	Written consent to be fingerprinted for the purpose of
14		a criminal history record check.
15	Informati	on obtained pursuant to subsection (a) and this
16	subsectio	n shall be used by the Hawaii health systems
17	<u>corporati</u>	on exclusively to determine whether a person is
18	suitable	for working or providing services in any of the
19	corporati	on's health facilities. All such decisions shall be
20	subject t	o federal laws and regulations currently or hereafter
21	in effect	<u>.</u>

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1	(c) Any Hawaii health systems corporation employee;
2	applicant for employment; or current or prospective contractor,
3	provider, or volunteer, or a current or prospective board member
4	who has been convicted of a criminal offense for which
5	incarceration is a sentencing option, may be terminated, not
6	hired, released, or be not used. This action shall be based on
7	the corporation's analysis of whether the nature and
8	circumstances of the crime may pose a risk to the health,
9	safety, or well-being of patients, residents, and organizations
10	in its health facilities.
11	(d) For the purposes of this section:
12	"Contractor" means any organization or individual that
13	enters into a contract or agreement to provide services to the
14	patients or residents in any of the Hawaii health systems
15	corporation's health facilities.
16	"Criminal history record check" means an examination of an
17	individual's criminal history records by means including
18	fingerprint analysis and name inquiry into state and national
19	criminal history record files.
20	"Provider" means any organization or individual that
21	currently provides or intends to enter into a contract or
22	agreement to provide services to the patients or residents in
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1	any of the Hawaii health systems corporation's health
2	facilities, or is a student in any program at any of the Hawaii
3	health systems corporation's health facilities.
4	(e) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, for
5	purposes of this section, the Hawaii health systems corporation
6	shall be exempt from section 831-3.1 and need not conduct
7	investigations, notifications, or hearings under this section in
8	accordance with chapter 91."
9	SECTION 2. Section 378-2.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
11	"(d) Notwithstanding subsections (b) and (c), the
12	requirement that inquiry into and consideration of a prospective
13	employee's conviction record may take place only after the
14	individual has received a conditional job offer, and the
15	limitation to the most recent ten-year period, excluding the
16	period of incarceration, shall not apply to employers who are
17	expressly permitted to inquire into an individual's criminal
18	history for employment purposes pursuant to any federal or state
19	law other than subsection (a), including:
20	(1) The State or any of its branches, political
21	subdivisions, or agencies pursuant to sections 78-2.7
22	and 831-3.1;

3	(3)	The department of health with respect to employees,

2	health facilities as provided by section 323F- ; and
3	[ <del>(28)</del> ] <u>(29)</u> Any other organization, entity, or the State,
4	its branches, political subdivisions, or agencies as
5	may be authorized by state law."
6	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
7	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
8	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2050.
