A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY FAMILIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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PART I

2 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii is experiencing difficult economic times. In February 2008, a 3 respected local economist commented that "[a]ll indications now 4 are for slower growth in Hawaii's near future." Real impacts 5 6 were felt soon after this prediction. On March 31, 2008, after sixty-one years of operation in Hawaii, Aloha Airlines announced 7 the discontinuation of its passenger service; on April 2, 2008, 8 9 ATA Airlines announced the discontinuation of all operations 10 after twenty-five years of operation; and on April 5, 2008, Molokai Properties Limited (commonly known as Molokai Ranch), 11 with a history spanning one hundred forty-five years, announced 12 13 its closure.

14 On March 30, 2008, one of Hawaii's daily newspapers noted, 15 "Hawaii mortgage delinquencies ratcheted up last year and show 16 no indication of slowing this year as economic growth weakens, 17 inflation remains strong and home values flatten." The

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department of business, economic development, and tourism, in 1 2 its latest estimates, anticipates a twelve per cent decrease in 3 total visitor arrivals, as compared to April of last year. Clearly, these are difficult economic times. Hawaii's 4 5 economy has slowed substantially, and the State's expenditure of 6 temporary assistance for needy family funds must not only account for this economic slowdown, but maintain reserves in 7 8 anticipation of a continued financial slump. 9 The legislature finds that the best approach is to continue supplying essential health, education, employment, and economic 10 11 assistance while preserving an adequate reserve of funds. While 12 maintaining cash reserves for future expenditures is imperative, so too is the continued provision of necessary support 13 programs. Such programs will yield healthier families, more 14 15 productive employees, and eventually, a stronger economy. 16 PART II SECTION 2. The legislature finds that it is imperative to 17 18 continue providing monthly cash benefits to families for food, clothing, shelter, and other essential items. Monthly cash 19 benefits are not only imperative for a family's survival, but 20 also act as a stimulus to the local economy when spent by 21 22 recipients at local retail outlets.

| 11 | SECTION 4. The legislature finds that a state's economy |
| 12 | depends upon its human capital. Having a self-sufficient, |
| 13 | dependable, and strong workforce is imperative to a robust |
| 14 | economy. Programs that train individuals for jobs, help with |
| 15 | job-search activities, and encourage financial self-sufficiency |
| 16 | result in a better-developed workforce and less strain on |
| 17 | support services and benefit programs. |
| 18 | SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the federal |
| 19 | temporary assistance for needy families funds the sum of |
| 20 | \$26,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal |
| 21 | year 2009-2010 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be |
| 22 | necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011 for obtaining job training |
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1 contracts and providing related support services for temporary 2 assistance for needy families and temporary assistance for other needy families recipients. 3 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 5 of human services for the purposes of this part. 6 PART IV SECTION 6. The legislature finds that Hawaii has the 7 8 twelfth highest teenage pregnancy rate in the nation. Young 9 women who become pregnant before the age of eighteen have a 10 higher risk of poverty, dropping out of high school, and 11 experiencing preterm births. The department of human services 12 contracted with The Lewin Group to determine the effectiveness 13 of teenage pregnancy education programs provided under temporary 14 assistance to needy families grants. The report found a 15 positive impact on program participants, and the state's general 16 trend is a decrease in teenage pregnancy rates. 17 The legislature finds that it is necessary for the 18 well-being of Hawaii's youth to educate them about the effects 19 of teenage pregnancy and the importance of educated decision-20 making through programs funded by the temporary assistance for

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needy families.

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| 1 | SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of federal temporary |
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| 2 | assistance for needy families funds the sum of \$12,000,000 or so |
| 3 | much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 and |
| 4 | the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal |
| 5 | year 2010-2011 for programs to prevent and reduce the incidence |
| 6 | of out-of-wedlock pregnancies and encourage the formation and |
| 7 | maintenance of two-parent families. |
| 8 | The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department |
| 9 | of human services for the purposes of this part. |
| 10 | PART V |
| 11 | SECTION 8. The legislature finds that it is important for |
| 12 | a family's emotional and economic well-being to maintain the |
| 13 | family unit. This can be achieved when families are provided |
| 14 | with the resources and education they need to be self-sufficient |
| 15 | and stable. |
| 16 | SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the federal |
| 17 | temporary assistance for needy families program funds the sum of |
| 18 | \$7,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal |
| 19 | year 2009-2010 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be |
| 20 | necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011 for purchase of service |
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| 1 | The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department |
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| 2 | of human services for the purposes of this part. |
| 3 | PART VI |
| 4 | SECTION 10. The legislature finds that it is necessary to |
| 5 | provide for greater flexibility in the expenditure of temporary |
| 6 | assistance for needy families funds to best address the State's |
| 7 | unique needs. Transferring program funds to block grant |
| 8 | programs will permit more freedom in the expenditure of program |
| 9 | funds, thus allowing for programs that are tailored to best |
| 10 | service Hawaii's needy population. The legislature further |
| 11 | finds that it is necessary to provide adequate funds for the |
| 12 | implementation of temporary assistance for needy families |
| 13 | programs. |
| 14 | SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the federal |
| 15 | temporary assistance for needy families funds the sum of |
| 16 | \$19,800,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal |
| 17 | year 2009-2010 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be |
| 18 | necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011 to be transferred to the |
| 19 | child care development fund. |
| 20 | The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department |

| 12 | year 2009-2010 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be |
| 13 | necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011 for information systems |
| 14 | costs related to the temporary assistance for needy families |
| 15 | program. |
| 16 | The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department |
| 17 | of human services for the purposes of this part. |
| 18 | SECTION 14. There is appropriated out of the federal |
| 19 | temporary assistance for needy families funds the sum of |
| 20 | \$9,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal |
| 21 | year 2009-2010 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be |
| 22 | necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011 for the costs of |
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| 1 | administering the temporary assistance for needy families |
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| 2 | program. |
| 3 | The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department |
| 4 | of human services for the purposes of this part. |

| 6 | SECTION 15. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2009. |
