A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHILDREN.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 321, part 28, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
2	is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"§321- Preschool education; continuation of services.
5	The parents of a child four years of age or older who was
6	previously eligible for early intervention services under 20
7	United States Code sections 1431 through 1444, shall have the
8	option to choose:
9	(1) The continuation of early intervention services, which
10	shall include an educational component that promotes
11	school readiness and incorporates pre-literacy,
12	language, and numeracy skills, until the child is
13	eligible under state law to enter kindergarten,
14	regardless of the child's eligibility for special
15	education services provided under 20 United States
16	Code sections 1411 through 1419; or



1	(2) The continuation of service coordination or case	
2	management as provided under 20 United States Code	
3	section 1436."	
4	SECTION 2. Section 321-351, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
5	amended to read as follows:	
6	"[-[]§321-351[]] Definitions. As used in this part, unless	
7	the context requires otherwise:	
8	"Biological risk" means prenatal, perinatal, neonatal, or	
9	early developmental events suggestive of biological insults to	
10	the developing central nervous system which increase the	
11	probability of delayed development.	
12	"Case management" means an ongoing service of shared	
13	responsibility between families and professionals that	
14	identifies needs and assists in obtaining coordinated,	
15	appropriate services and resources.	
16	["Delayed development" means a significant delay in one or	
17	more of the following areas of development: cognition, speech,	
18	language, physical, motor, vision, hearing, psychosocial, or	
19	self-help-skills.]	
20	"Department" means the department of health.	
21	"Developmental delay" means a significant delay in one or	
22	more of the following areas of development: cognition, speech,	
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1	language,	physical, motor, vision, hearing, psychosocial, or
2	self-help	skills.
3	"Dir	ector" means the director of health.
4	"Ear	ly intervention services" means services which:
5	(1)	Are provided under public supervision;
6	(2)	Are provided at no cost, except where federal or state
7		law provides for a system of payments by families,
8		including a sliding fee schedule;
9	(3)	Are designed to meet the developmental needs of
10		[infants and toddlers with special needs, which
11		include but are not limited to] an infant or toddler
12		with a disability, as identified by the individualized
13		family service plan team, in one or more of the
14		following areas: physical development, cognitive
15		development, [and self-help skills;] communication
16		development, social or emotional development, or
17		adaptive development;
18	(4)	Are provided by qualified professional and
19		paraprofessional personnel;
20	(5)	Are provided in conformity with an individualized
21		family [support] service plan; [and]



1 (6) Include [but are not limited to]: family [support,] training, counseling, and home visits; special 2 instruction; [speech] speech-language pathology and 3 audiology services, and sign language and cued 4 language services as appropriate to infants and 5 6 toddlers with or without hearing loss; occupational 7 therapy; physical therapy; music therapy; 8 psychological services; case management services; 9 medical services only for diagnostic or evaluation 10 purposes; early identification, screening, and assessment services; [and] health services necessary 11 12 to enable the infant or toddler to benefit from the 13 other early intervention services [-]; social work 14 services; vision services; assistive technology 15 devices and assistive technology services; and 16 transportation and necessary related costs; and 17 To the maximum extent possible, are provided in (7) natural environments, including home and community 18 settings in which children without disabilities can 19 20 participate.



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1	"Env	ironmental risk" means physical, social, or economic
2	factors w	hich may limit development. Environmental risk
3	includes[, but is not limited to] the following conditions:
4	(1)	Birthweight between 1,500 and 2,500 grams, in
5		combination with any other environmental risk factor;
6	(2)	Parental age less than sixteen;
7	(3)	Parental age between sixteen and eighteen and less
8		than a high school education in combination with any
9		other environmental risk factor;
10	(4)	Any existing physical, developmental, emotional, or
11		psychiatric disability in a primary caregiver;
12	(5)	Presence of physical, developmental, emotional, or
13		psychiatric disability in a sibling or any other
14		family member in the home in combination with any
15		other environmental risk factor;
16	(6)	Abuse of any legal or illegal substance by a primary
17		caregiver;
18	(7)	Child abuse and neglect of target child or siblings;
19	(8)	Economically disadvantaged family in combination with
20		any other environmental risk factor;
21	(9)	Single parent in combination with any other
22		environmental risk factor; and



1	(10) Incarceration of a primary caregiver in combination
2	with any other environmental risk factor.
3	"Functional skills" means age appropriate essential
4	activities of daily life such as eating and communicating.
5	"Habilitative therapy" means care provided to individuals
6	with developmental or chronic conditions, or both, that
7	significantly limit normal development. Conditions include, but
8	are not limited to, deafness, speech or language impairments,
9	serious emotional disturbance, orthopedic impairment, traumatic
10	injury, autism spectrum disorders, and blindness. To be
11	considered habilitative, care must produce functional
12	improvement and measurable progress within a period of time
13	reasonable for the situation.
14	["Individual family support plan"] <u>"Individualized family</u>
15	service plan" means a dynamic, voluntary plan of action and
16	support developed by families and professionals that emanates
17	from the families' expressions of needs and goals.
18	["Infants and toddlers-with special needs" means infants
19	and toddlers from birth-to-the age of three with delayed
20	development, biological risk, or environmental risk.]



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1	<u>"Inf</u>	ant or toddler with a disability" means an individual
2	under thr	ee years of age who needs early intervention services
3	because t	he individual:
4	(1)	Experiences developmental delays as measured by
5		appropriate diagnostic instruments and procedures in
6		one or more of the areas of cognitive development,
7		physical development, communication development,
8		social or emotional development, and adaptive
9		development; or
10	(2)	Has a diagnosed physical or mental condition that has
11		a high probability of resulting in developmental
12		delay.
13	"Spe	ech-language pathology services" means services
14	necessary	for the diagnosis and treatment of speech, language,
15	and swall	owing disorders caused by disease, surgery, injury, and
16	congenita	l or developmental anomalies. Speech-language
17	pathology	services assess, diagnose, and treat disorders of
18	speech, l	anguage, swallowing, sensory awareness related to
19	speech or	swallowing, and cognitive aspects of communication."
20	SECT	ION 3. Section 321-352, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended t	o read as follows:



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1	"§321-352 Early intervention services for infants [and
2	toddlers with special needs.] or toddlers with disabilities.
3	The department [may] shall develop a statewide, coordinated,
4	multidisciplinary program which contains a continuum of services
5	to meet the needs of infants [and] <u>or</u> toddlers with [special
6	needs.] disabilities. The department shall be the lead agency
7	for the coordination of federal and state funding for those
8	programs. Pursuant to chapter 103F, the department may purchase
9	services appropriate to carry out activities under this part."
10	SECTION 4. Section 321-353, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended to read as follows:
12	"§321-353 Hawaii [early intervention] state interagency
13	coordinating council; establishment. [(a)] There is established
14	within the department for administrative purposes the Hawaii
15	[early intervention] state interagency coordinating council.
16	[Members shall be appointed for three year terms by the governor
17	without the necessity of the advice and consent of the senate.
18	The membership of the council shall consist of fifteen members
19	selected_from_the_following:
20	(1) At least three parents of infants, toddlers, or

children under the age of seven with special needs;

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1	(2)	At least three public or private providers of early
2		intervention services;
3	(3)	At least one representative from the legislature;
4	-(4-)-	At least one person involved in personnel preparation;
5	(5)	At-least one member representing the department of
6		education;
7	(6) -	At-least one member representing the department of
8		human services;
9	(7)	At least one member representing the office of the
10		governor; and
11	(8)	Other members representing-private-or-public agencies
12		involved in or interested in the payment for or
13		provision of services to infants and toddlers with
14		special needs and their families.
15	Any	vacancy on the council shall be filled in the same
16	manner in	which the original position was filled.
17	- (b)	The council shall elect its officers, and eight
18	members s	hall constitute a quorum. Members shall serve without
19	compensat	ion but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including
20	travel ex	penses, necessary for the performance of their duties.



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1	(c) The-council shall meet at least quarterly-and in-such
2	places as it deems necessary. The meetings shall be publicly
3	announced, and be open and accessible to the general public.
3	announced, and be open and accessible to the general public.
4	(d) The council shall perform the following functions:
5	(1) Advise and assist-the director in the identification
6	of the sources of fiscal and other support for
7	services for early intervention programs, assignment
8	of financial responsibility to the appropriate agency,
9	and the promotion of the interagency agreements;
10	(2) Advise and assist the department in the preparation of
11	applications and amendments thereto; and
12	(3) Prepare and submit an annual report to the governor
13	on the status of early intervention programs for
14	infants and toddlers with special needs and their
15	families within the State.] The interagency
16	coordinating council shall be established and shall perform
17	duties as provided under 42 United States Code section 1441."
18	SECTION 5. Section 321-357, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended to read as follows:
20	"[+]§321-357[+] Early intervention funds; purpose and use.
21	(a) The purpose of the early intervention special fund and
22	early intervention trust fund is to expand and enhance early
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1 intervention services for infants [and] or toddlers with 2 [special needs] disabilities by providing a cooperative funding 3 mechanism between the public and private sectors to work 4 together to make and secure appropriations and donations to the 5 funds. 6 The department may procure services under chapters (b) 103D and 103F in accordance with criteria and procedures 7 8 established by rules adopted pursuant to chapter 91, for community-based, family-centered, early intervention services 9 10 including [but not limited to]: 11 Programs to provide early intervention services for (1)12 infants and toddlers with developmental delays or at 13 biological or environmental risk; Family support programs to strengthen families to 14 (2)15 reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect; 16 Training and education for professionals, (3) 17 paraprofessionals, and families; and Research, evaluation, and data management related to 18 (4)19 early intervention services. 20 (C) Services to be procured under this section shall be in accordance with chapters 103D and 103F and take the following 21

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1	(1)	Purchase of service contracts to private nonprofit
2		organizations, public agencies, or qualified
3		individuals to provide community-based,
4		family-centered, early intervention services; or
5	(2)	Direct payments for services, educational materials,
6		training, quality assurance, equipment, data
7		collection, and program evaluation.
8	(d)	The Hawaii [carly intervention] state interagency
9	coordinat	ing council shall make recommendations to the
10	departmen	t for the expenditure of moneys from the funds."
11	SECT	ION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
12	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
13	much ther	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 for
14	the purpo	se of providing early intervention services to children
15	who are o	lder than three years of age but who are ineligible
16	under sta	te law to enter kindergarten.
17	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
18	health fo	r the purposes of this Act.
19	SECT	ION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.
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SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
provided that section 6 shall take effect on July 1, 2009
