### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE FOUNDATION ON CULTURE AND THE ARTS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the state foundation
- ${f 2}$  on culture and the arts was established by the legislature in
- 3 1965, to promote, perpetuate, preserve, and encourage culture
- 4 and the arts, history, and the humanities as central to the
- 5 quality of life of the people of Hawaii.
- 6 Since its inception, the foundation has provided millions
- 7 of dollars to arts and cultural programming statewide, and the
- 8 art in public places program, established in 1967, was the first
- 9 such program in the nation created to help local artists through
- $10\,$  a separate method of funding the arts by accessing one per cent
- 11 of the construction cost of new state buildings. Currently, the
- 12 foundation is responsible for: the artists in the schools
- 13 program, which provides opportunities for K-12 public school
- 14 students to work with professional artists (established in
- 15 1970); the folk arts program, initiated through a grant from the
- 16 National Endowment for the Arts, to promote and perpetuate
- 17 traditional folk arts throughout the State (1983); the works of

- 1 the long-term planning and completion of public art projects
- 2 (1989); the individual artist fellowship program to recognize
- 3 and honor exceptionally talented visual and performing artists
- 4 (1993); and the Hawaii state art museum, which opened in the
- 5 fall of 2002 with three galleries featuring artworks from the
- 6 art in public places collection.
- 7 In 2008, foundation grants comprised \$249,000 in state
- 8 general funds and generated matching funds of \$1,026,000 from
- 9 private, federal, and other sources. Artists in the schools
- 10 received \$215,000 in general funds and \$225,000 in private
- 11 matching funds. Arts first received \$640,391 in state funding
- 12 and \$1,828,963 in private and federal funds. These three
- 13 programs alone generated \$3,079,963 in non-state revenue to
- 14 match \$1,104,391 in state support. It is estimated that these
- 15 grants partially funded more than 2,300 tax-paying jobs and
- 16 resulted in arts organizations attracting more than \$12,000,000
- 17 to the State's economy.
- 18 The legislature is concerned that cuts in either program
- 19 funding or personnel to support these programs will have a
- 20 widespread detrimental effect on Hawaii's diverse array of
- 21 culture and arts network of artists, performing arts
- 22 organizations, museums, galleries and art retailers, ethnic

- 1 neighborhoods, entertainers, musicians, and school arts programs
- 2 throughout the State. In addition, Hawaii's unique cultural and
- 3 arts offerings play an important role in enhancing the Hawaii
- 4 visitor experience and maintaining a steady flow of visitors to
- 5 Hawaii's shores from the mainland and overseas.
- 6 The state foundation on culture and the arts is also the
- 7 designated arts agency for partnership with the National
- 8 Endowment for the Arts, and in its forty-four-year association,
- 9 the foundation has consistently met the National Endowment for
- 10 the Arts criteria to receive and distribute federal funds. The
- 11 legislature is concerned that the loss of foundation staff may
- 12 jeopardize the foundation's ability to satisfactorily meet
- 13 federal requirements, which could result in the foundation
- 14 losing its status as the National Endowment for the Arts partner
- 15 and eliminate the largest source of public funding for arts in
- 16 the State.
- 17 The purpose of this Act is to enhance the fiscal stability
- 18 of the state foundation on culture and the arts by authorizing
- 19 use of the works of art special fund to fund the position costs
- 20 of the executive director of the state foundation on culture and
- 21 the arts and any other employee of the foundation, for a
- 22 five-year period.

1	SECTION 2. Section 103-8.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
3	"(b) The works of art special fund shall be used solely
4	for the following purposes:
5	(1) Costs related to the acquisition of works of art,
6	including any consultant or staff services required to
7	carry out the art in public places and relocatable
8	works of art programs;
9	(2) Site modifications, display, and interpretive work
10	necessary for the exhibition of works of art;
11	(3) Upkeep services, including maintenance, repair, and
12	restoration of works of art;
13	(4) Storing and transporting works of $art[-]$ ; and
14	(5) Pay the salary, wage, and fringe benefit costs of the
15	executive director of the state foundation on culture
16	and the arts and any other employee of the foundation
17	hired pursuant to chapter 9."
18	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
19	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
20	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2010;
21	provided that this Act shall be repealed on June 30, 2015, and
22	section 103-8.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in

- 1 the form in which it read on the day before the effective date
- 2 of this Act.
