A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FORCE FEEDING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. Foie gras in French literally translates to

 refer to the enlarged, fattened liver

 of a goose or duck. The liver of the goose or duck becomes
- 4 enlarged due to excessive feeding and lack of exercise. In
- 5 order to enlarge the liver, farmers use a method of force
- 6 feeding, where a metal tube or pipe is inserted into the bird's
- 7 throat while the food is introduced. The process is designed to
- 8 mimic how birds gorge themselves prior to migration; however, a
- 9 force feeding pipe can puncture a bird's throat, sometimes
- 10 causing the bird to bleed to death. The mortality rate of the
- 11 birds during the force feeding period is six times greater than
- 12 during breeding, due also in part to the numerous side effects
- 13 of having an enlarged liver, such as diarrhea, bone
- 14 demineralization, and other digestive diseases.
- Only two companies in the United States produce foie gras,
- 16 one in California and one in New York. In 2004, California
- 17 adopted a ban on the production and sale of foie gras that is

- 1 produced using the method of force feeding. The ban will take
- 2 effect in 2012. The measure narrowly applies to foie gras
- 3 produced using the method of force feeding, and the president of
- 4 the only foie gras producer in California has publicly stated
- 5 that his farm will find a humane method of producing foie gras
- 6 prior to the ban taking effect.
- 7 The legislature finds that the practice of force feeding
- 8 ducks and geese for foie gras is an excessively cruel practice
- 9 and determines that foie gras sold in Hawaii should be produced
- 10 using humane methods.
- 11 SECTION 2. Chapter 161, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 13 to read as follows:
- 14 "PART . FORCE FEEDING PRODUCTS PROHIBITED
- 15 §161- Definitions. For the purposes of this part:
- 16 "Bird" includes a duck or goose.
- 17 "Force feeding" means a process that causes the bird to
- 18 consume more food than a typical bird of the same species would
- 19 consume voluntarily. Force feeding methods include delivering
- 20 feed through a tube or other device inserted into the bird's
- 21 esophagus.

- 1 §161- Force feeding products; prohibition; penalties.
- 2 (a) A product shall not be sold or distributed in the State if
- 3 it is the result of force feeding a bird for the purpose of
- 4 enlarging the bird's liver beyond normal size.
- 5 (b) Any person who violates this part or any rule adopted
- 6 by the department pursuant to this part shall be fined not more
- 7 than \$10,000 for each separate offense. Each date of violation
- 8 shall constitute a separate offense. Any action taken to impose
- 9 or collect the penalty provided for in this subsection shall be
- 10 considered a civil action.
- 11 (c) The department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
- 12 necessary for the purposes of this part."
- 13 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 14 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 15 begun before its effective date.
- 16 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2010.
