A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONSTRUCTION SITES.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's economy is
2	driven by	thousands of businesses that provide essential goods,
3	services,	and jobs. However, an underground economy exists that
4	threatens	the ability of legitimate businesses to effectively
5	compete i	n the marketplace. Underground business operations
6	typically	
7	(1)	Avoid licensing requirements;
8	(2)	Pay wages in cash, allowing the avoidance of payroll
9		taxes, unemployment insurance, disability insurance,
10		personal income tax, and paid family leave;
11	(3)	Employ vulnerable workers, new immigrants, and
12		economically disadvantaged individuals;
13	(4)	Fail to pay minimum wages required by state and
14		federal law;
15	(5)	Fail to carry workers' compensation insurance; and
16	(6)	Avoid worker and workplace safety requirements.
17	The	legislature further finds that underground business
18	operation	s drive down wages, create harsh working conditions,

- 1 and undercut a legitimate business' profit margins. Underground
- 2 business operations are a threat to the State's economy,
- 3 workforce, and consumers.
- 4 The purpose of this Act is to create a construction site
- 5 inspection task force to investigate and inspect construction
- 6 sites for unlicensed contractors, illegal workers, and workplace
- 7 safety violations.
- 8 SECTION 2. Chapter 444, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 10 and to read as follows:
- 11 "§444- Construction site inspection task force. (a)
- 12 The director shall establish a construction site inspection task
- 13 force attached to the department of commerce and consumer
- 14 affairs for administrative purposes. The director, or the
- 15 director's designee, shall serve as chairperson of the
- 16 construction site inspection task force. The task force shall
- 17 include at least two representatives from the department of
- 18 commerce and consumer affairs, the department of labor and
- 19 industrial relations, and the department of taxation. The task
- 20 force also shall include a representative from each county
- 21 permitting department.
- (b) The construction site inspection task force shall:

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1		<u>(T)</u>	racilitate and encourage the development and sharing
2			of information by the participating agencies necessary
3			to combat the underground economy including shared
4			automated information database systems, the use of a
5			common business identification number, and a
6			centralized debt collection system;
7		(2)	Improve the coordination of activities among the
8			participating agencies;
9		(3)	Develop methods to pool, focus, and target the
10			enforcement resources of the participating agencies in
11			order to deter tax evasion, unlicensed contractor
12			activity, and workplace safety violations and maximize
13			recoveries from violators of applicable laws and
14			rules; and
15		(4)	Reduce enforcement costs wherever possible by
16			eliminating duplicative audits and investigations.
17		(C)	In addition, the task force shall have the authority
18	<u>to:</u>		
19		(1)	Form joint enforcement teams to utilize the existing
20	·		collective investigative and enforcement capabilities
21			of the participating members, including inspectors
22			appointed by the director or by participating members.

1		The joint enforcement teams shall conduct site				
2		inspections on sites suspected of engaging in tax				
3		evasion, unlicensed contractor activity, and workpla				
4		safety violations. The teams also shall conduct				
5		random site inspections to ensure compliance with				
6		existing laws;				
7	(2)	Solicit the cooperation and participation of other				
8		state and local agencies in carrying out the				
9		objectives of the task force;				
10	(3)	Establish procedures for soliciting referrals from the				
11		public, including but not limited to an advertised				
12		telephone hotline;				
13	(4)	Develop procedures to permit the use of civil				
14		sanctions in lieu of criminal actions wherever				
15		possible; and				
16	(5)	Evaluate the need for statutory changes to achieve the				
17		purposes of this section, including:				
18		(A) Eliminating barriers to interagency information				
19		sharing;				
20		(B) Improving the ability of the participating				
21		agencies to audit, investigate, and prosecute				
22		violations;				

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1	((Deterring violations and improve voluntary			
2		compliance;			
3	1)	Establishing centralized, automated debt			
4		collection services for the participating			
5		agencies; and			
6	<u>(</u> E	E) Emphasizing civil penalties instead of criminal			
7		ones whenever possible.			
8	(d) Fo	or purposes of this section, members of any joint			
9	enforcement team formed by the task force pursuant to subsection				
10	(c)(1) may enter at reasonable times, without prior notice, any				
11	property, public or private, for the purpose of investigating				
12	and inspecting the condition or operation of any construction				
13	site thereor	<u>a.</u>			
14	(e) Th	ne task force shall submit an annual report to the			
15	legislature no later than twenty days before the convening of				
16	each regular session. The report shall include but not be				
17	limited to a	all of the following:			
18	<u>(1)</u> <u>Th</u>	ne number of cases of violations and noncompliance			
19	<u>w</u> :	ith tax laws identified, audited, investigated, or			
20	<u>p</u> 1	rosecuted through civil action or referred for			
21	CI	riminal prosecution;			

1	(2)	Actions	s taken by the task force to publicize its
2		activi	ties; and
3	<u>(3)</u>	Recomme	endations for any legislation needed to
4		accomp.	lish the goals described in subsection (c)(5)."
