A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHARMACIST LICENSURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

PART I

2 SECTION 1. The University of Hawaii at Hilo college of 3 pharmacy accepted its first class in the fall of 2007 and is the only accredited pharmacy school in Hawaii and the Pacific basin. 4 5 For decades, Hawaii has been viewed as the crossroads of the Pacific, merging cultures and people from all walks of life. 6 Students from Hawaii, other states, the United States 7 8 territories and possessions, and even other countries, come to 9 study at the University of Hawaii at Hilo's college of pharmacy. 10 The University of Hawaii at Hilo college of pharmacy is 11 currently on track for full accreditation in 2011 when its first 12 class of pharmacy students will graduate.

13 To graduate from the college of pharmacy, students must 14 participate in advanced pharmacy practice experiences in their 15 fourth and final year. The advanced pharmacy practice 16 experiences begin in the summer after the third year of pharmacy 17 school and include a minimum of one thousand four hundred forty 18 hours of practical experience. different types of rotations. Mandatory rotations include a
 hospital or health system pharmacy, an inpatient/acute care
 facility, an ambulatory care clinic, and a community pharmacy.
 Students may take an additional two electives to fulfill the
 experience requirements.

The first class of the University of Hawaii at Hilo college 6 of pharmacy will begin their advanced pharmacy practice 7 8 experience rotations in May of 2010. Students will perform their rotations in the traditional pharmacy setting as well as 9 10 other designated advanced practice locations under the 11 supervision of a registered pharmacist where the practice of 12 pharmacy occurs. Geographically, the rotations will occur in 13 Hawaii and other states, the District of Columbia, and the 14 United States territories.

15 As section 461-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is currently written, only the hours of practical experience performed in a 16 17 pharmacy in one of the fifty states count toward the one thousand five hundred hours of practical experience required for 18 19 licensure as a pharmacist. As such, students who perform their rotations outside of the traditional pharmacy setting will not 20 21 receive credit toward their licensure requirements, even though those students are engaged in the practice of pharmacy under the 22 SB2390 HD1 HMS 2010-2626 2

supervision of a registered pharmacist at other designated
 advanced practice locations, such as clinics and acute care
 facilities. Moreover, advanced pharmacy practice experience
 rotations performed in one of the United States territories or
 the District of Columbia will not count toward licensure
 requirements.

7 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to ensure that
8 advanced pharmacy practice experience rotations performed in a
9 United States territory or the District of Columbia, or at a
10 designated advanced practice location under the supervision of a
11 registered pharmacist, count toward licensure requirements.
12 SECTION 2. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

13 amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted 14 and to read as follows:

15 "<u>"Territory" means Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana</u>
16 Islands, the Virgin Islands, Guam, or American Samoa."

17 SECTION 3. Section 461-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

19 "(a) Any applicant for a license as a pharmacist shall
20 submit an application on a form prescribed by the board and
21 shall provide evidence to the board that the applicant:

22 (1) Is at least eighteen years of age;

1 public-health necessity or eighteen years of age 2 or older, by a pharmacist having appropriate 3 training that includes programs approved by the 4 ACPE, curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-5 accredited college of pharmacy, state or local 6 health department programs, or programs 7 recognized by the board of pharmacy; 8 As authorized by a licensed physician's written (F) instructions, initiating or adjusting the drug 9 regimen of a patient pursuant to an order or 10 11 authorization made by the patient's licensed 12 physician and related to the condition for which the patient has been seen by the licensed 13 physician; provided that the pharmacist shall 14 15 issue written notification to the patient's 16 licensed physician or enter the appropriate 17 information in an electronic patient record system shared by the licensed physician, within 18 19 twenty-four hours;

Removes the requirement that supervision must take place in a pharmacy. Broadens the experience requirements to relate to the practice of pharmacy. (SB2390 HD1)
