A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that reductions and
2	restrictions to the department of education's operating budget
3	of over \$49,000,000 for the 2009-2010 fiscal year and over
4	\$226,000,000 for the 2010-2011 fiscal year have resulted in the
5	scheduled loss of seventeen instructional days for ten-month
6	non-charter public school students and twenty-one instructional
7	days for twelve-month non-charter public school students during
8	the 2009-2010 school year and the same number of lost
9	instructional days during the 2010-2011 school year. The
10	legislature further finds that if nothing is done to prevent the
11	loss of these instructional days, Hawaii will become the state
12	with the fewest number of instructional days in a school year.
13	The State has received much criticism for responding to budget
14	shortfalls in a manner that decreases learning opportunities and
15	quality instructional time for students. On a national level,
16	the United States Secretary of Education has strongly criticized

the decision to decrease instructional days, especially since

- 1 Hawaii is scheduled to receive approximately \$500,000,000 from
- 2 the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, part of
- 3 which is intended to avoid significant cuts to education and
- 4 advance school reform. The Secretary has also indicated that
- 5 the loss of instructional days has weakened the State's
- 6 competitiveness for additional federal education grants. For
- 7 these reasons, the legislature finds that the loss of
- 8 instructional days for Hawaii's students is a short-sighted
- 9 solution that will have detrimental long-term effects on
- 10 Hawaii's students, reputation, and future.
- 11 Despite the great need for additional resources in many
- 12 areas that would benefit the public, the legislature finds that
- 13 providing a quality education for Hawaii's students is an
- 14 overriding state priority with far-reaching effects on the
- 15 prosperity, health, and growth of local communities and that
- 16 ensuring adequate resources for education reflects a commitment
- 17 and investment toward that priority. According to the
- 18 department of education, it costs approximately \$6,600,000 per
- 19 day to run Hawaii's public schools. To meet this fiscal need,
- 20 the legislature finds that an appropriation of Hawaii hurricane
- 21 relief funds is necessary to maintain an essential level of

- 1 programs and resources to provide Hawaii's students with a
- 2 quality education.
- 3 The legislature declares that the appropriation made under
- 4 this Act shall not be construed to mean that the legislature, in
- 5 any way, intends to interfere with the processes of public
- 6 sector collective bargaining as authorized under the state
- 7 constitution and chapter 89, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate \$75,000,000 in
- 9 Hawaii hurricane relief funds to restore as many instructional
- 10 days scheduled to be lost during the 2010-2011 school year as
- 11 possible, with any remaining funds to be used to restore as many
- 12 remaining lost instructional days during the 2009-2010 school
- 13 year as possible.
- 14 SECTION 2. Notwithstanding provisions of chapter 431P,
- 15 Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the contrary, there is appropriated
- 16 out of the Hawaii hurricane relief fund the sum of \$75,000,000
- or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011
- 18 to restore as many instructional days during the 2010-2011
- 19 school year as possible; provided that any remaining funds shall
- 20 be used to restore as many instructional days during the
- 21 2009-2010 school year as possible.
